"As We See It" By J. A. Strong

WITH THE JAPANESE carrying on a war in China, for the last five years or so, and during all that time never getting to first base and then for them to strike out at the Philippines in a surprise attack and to be able to clean up almost everything before them, makes one wonder what it is that the Chinese have that the defenders of the Philippines lacked. True it is so that the Japs haven't been having it so much their own way during recent weeks yet our side haven't been able to retaliate to any great extent. Perhaps the idea of attacking Japan proper may be the solution to the problem in the Pacific. The fall of Japan itself would save the Allies the trouble of retaking all those islands one by one. No doubt those responsible for the conduct of the war in the Pacific know what they are doing and working over the situation by any of our own help conditions even a little bit.

DO YOU SUPPOSE THE scarcity of rubber will affect the supply of rubber checks that have a habit of bouncing back from time to time? We haven't noticed any statistics recently regarding the supply of rubber checks, but at one time there seemed to be too many of them altogether. Why anyone would go to the trouble of writing out a check and then fail to provide funds to meet it is beyond us. You have all the advantages of being able to do as you like, to enjoy the comforts of the best bed of all, and you can even forget your pocket book into the bargain. If you want a sunbath you have all the privacy possible and the bath tub is away ahead of any lake. Of course if you must go in for swimming you may have to hunt up "the ole swimmer" but outside of that a holiday that has everything can be enjoyed right at home with a big saving in costs. The idea even sounds patriotic.

IN SPITE OF WAR conditions we are to have senior lacrosse again this season, with six teams in the series. Owen Sound is a new entry in the senior group, and you may recall that they won the senior B group last year. Some of the other teams objected to Owen Sound's entry this season because of the location which means a long drive.
