

Cross. Canada contributed \$7,300 to the International Society this year. One of the largest expenditures on the part of the Red Cross is the prisoner-of-war fund, which requires almost three and a half million dollars to finance it. An excellent purchasing committee enables the Red Cross to send foods abundant in calories. thereby taking a tremendous burden off the shoulders of the British Red Cross. Each food parcel, planned by experts, is valued at \$2.50 and contains 16 oz. whole milk powder, 16 oz. butter, 4 oz. cheese, 12 oz. corned beef, 10 oz. pork luncheon meat, 8 cz. raisins, 8 oz. dried prunes, 8 oz. sugar, 16 oz. jam, 16 oz. pilot biscults, 8 oz. cating chocolate, 1 oz. salt and

pepper, 4 oz. tea and 2 oz. soap. The will enable them to send twice as many parcels as they are already doing. Can you not visualize the faces of our Canadian boys when they receive these parcels? Is it not worth something to you to share in their joy that Canada has not forgotten them? Nor does the Georgetown Red Cross depend entirely on the canvass.
