Weston Is Salvage Conscious - How About Georgetown?

Mrs. C. J. Lynch and Mrs. Alex Barton gave an excellent talk on "The Weston Salvage Committee," at a W. A. meeting group held at Georgetown United Church at the home of Mrs. Victor Macdonald.

About 30 women were present. Amongst these were Mrs. J. B. Macdonald, representative of The Lion-Club, Mrs. Clarence Hayes, President of Local Council of Women, Mrs. C. V. Williams, Representative of the I. O. O. E. and Mrs. K. Preston, who is so active in collecting for Georgetown Salvage.

A display of Salvage was set before the audience newspapers tied in flat bundles, magazines tied in bundles, cardboard tied flat, rubber bands, rubber rings, pieces of hose, old, high, old stockings, metal of all kinds, the overall and knitted cap, worn by those collecting on the trucks, were shown.

The trucks—five or six of them, go from house to house on Monday evenings. All these trucks, in some cases, drivers as well, are donated. All the remaining days of the week are divided amongst groups of women's associations. Each group sorts and packs the salvage in a warehouse donated for the purpose by the Town Council since September of 1941. The trucks have called regularly every Monday, finishing up Tuesday morning if necessary.

Arrangements were made to sell miscellaneous articles to a reliable dealer. This Salvage Corps has averaged \$100 a week, which sum if kept would finance the Red Cross of Weston. Weston Salvage Committee is sponsored by the Town Council.

Mr. Wisdorf, of Polish origin, is the business manager. A number of the women who do the collecting, have taken the motor mechanic's training and so are equal to driving the trucks. Each driver has 6 or 8 girls in the truck to help in collecting from the houses and to arrange the salvage on the truck.

Weston Salvage Committee gets a 10¢ space in the Weston "Times and Guide" each week. The publicity is straight to the point and arresting. The Committee is registered in Ontario and receives bulletins regularly. Heavy paper bags are distributed amongst all householders and business places. These are taken into the truck and another bag given for further filling. Bags have now been supplied, because they are more substantial and so will last longer. Since last September, when collections were instituted, volunteer workers have raised \$1800.00 up to the present. The last paragraph of their annual report reads thus:

"Our soldiers can rise to any ordeal, endure untold suffering, endless hardship and even death, so I would ask all at this meeting to go out and talk salvage, help with the salvage, and save salvage so we will be able to say that in Weston at least we have tried to do our part in this total war effort."

"There can be no peace for any of us until the cancer of Nazism has been eradicated. What can justice or charity mean to a group of men inspired by no ideal, restrained by no laws, disdainful of its obligations of solemn pacts, and dedicated to nothing save their own advancement. Therefore, we resolve to save all salvage, sort all salvage, collect all salvage, and in the end we will salvage everything worthwhile living for."
