The Fight At Home

Under the above title, there appeared recently in the daily press (*Globe and Mail*, May 4th, 5th and 6th) a series of articles, evidently sponsored by the Ontario Department of Health, dealing with the increasing menace of venereal disease, and urging a frank recognition by the public of the danger, and outlining what is being done by the department, to meet it.

A group of citizens interested in public welfare, have made themselves responsible for placing on the table of the Public Library, the articles referred to above, and also other material from the findings of outstanding medical authorities on this subject.

Therefore, the *Globe and Mail* article did not mention one of the chief causes of venereal disease, alcohol, in situations where it is used.

duction of moral laxity, responsible often for the spread of infection.

So well recognized is the connection between beverage alcohol and this problem that a few years ago, the president of the American Social Hygiene Association, Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, said: "There is a direct relationship between the increasing use of liquor and the amount of gonorrhoea and syphilis in the United States. There is no possibility of success in the campaign against syphilis with the widespread use of alcoholic beverages."

Dr. Haven Emerson, Professor of Public Health Practice, Columbia University, in his book "Alcohol Its Effects on Man," devotes a chapter to this subject, explaining carefully the scientific aspect of this phase of the problem.

To ignore these findings of modern scientific research is to exhibit the wisdom of that mythical ostrich which was supposed to stick his head in the sand, in order to avoid being worried about the trouble ahead.
