Public School Invests \$2,266.00 in War Savings

Citizens of Georgetown may well be proud of the contribution made to our country's War Savings Campaign by the pupils of our Public School. The sum of \$1340.00 was realized by the weekly sale of stamps to the pupils from October 1, 1941, to June 25, 1942. The grand sales total since the inauguration of the campaign in January, 1941, amounted to \$2,266.00 and the total number of certificates completed during the year from October 1, 1941, to June 25, 1942, was 336. It is estimated that 70 per cent of the pupils bought their stamps regularly.

The Georgetown Lions Club helped the campaign get a good start by contributing the final stamp on the first certificate completed by each pupil. The entire teaching staff, under the leadership of Mr. Howard Wrigglesworth, principal, was responsible for conducting the project, and is to be congratulated on the success which has crowned their efforts to make the Public School War Savings Campaign an outstandingly high one in the records of Halton County.

National War Finance Committee Formed in Georgetown

W. V. GRANT HEADS NEW WAR FINANCE ORGANIZATION

Will Embrace All Phases of Government Borrowing — L. E. Flock County Vice-Chairman

At a meeting in the Public Library last Thursday night, officials were chosen to head the new National War Finance Committee of Georgetown. Since the recent decision of the Government to consolidate all war finance organizations under one committee, similar meetings have been held throughout the county, and plans are being laid for a drive for the sale of war savings stamps and certificates, to start early next month.

Chairman of the Georgetown Committee is W. V. Grant, of Provincial Paper, Ltd., who has already successfully led the first and second Victory Loan campaigns. Assisting him as vice-chairman are Le Roy Dale, E. C. of the law firm of Dale & Bennett, Lieut.-Col. O. B. S. Cousins, Georgetown postmaster, Arthur Beaumont, of Joseph Beaumont Hooley, Glen Williams, and Howard May, Reeve of Esqueping Township. Col. Cousins, who has been chairman of the local War Savings Committee, will continue his work along this line in the new set-up. Public Relations will be handled by W. F. Bradley, of the Dominion Seed House, while R. E. Foulis, of Provincial Paper Ltd. will head the Employees Committee. These men will form the nucleus of the committee in the Georgetown district, with

other offices to be filled at a later date. L. E. Flock, of Alliance Paper Mills, has been chosen as Halton County vice-chairman a position which he filled in previous Victory Loans.

L. C. Amy, unit organizer for Halton County, was present at the meeting and explained details of the new set-up, which will be for the duration of the war. O. Doherty, of Toronto, is organizer for the Niagara Peninsula, while George Harrison, of Toronto, is liaison officer for the four counties. The Halton unit office will be in Oakville, with H. P. Warner as secretary.

Mrs. Sam Mackenzie's Father Dies
