Esqueusing Township Council held their regular meeting on Monday evening with all members present. Rev. C. H. May presided. Minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Mr. Higgins, District Engineer, attended the meeting in connection with the work that was to have been done at washout at O'Connell Williams, as it would be impossible to maintain it well owing to quicksand.

Mr. Frank Fitch addressed Council asking for increase in grants to Esqueusing and Acton Fair Boards owing to the County Grants having been reduced, and Mr. E. Harrop, on behalf of the Milton Fair Board, asked for the usual Grant.

A statement from the Auditor was presented, showing all taxes owing as of May 31st, 1942.

The Council advise all householders of the urgent necessity for prompt action in securing their winter supply of fuel, as there is likely to be a fuel shortage owing to transportation difficulties.
