Britain's Front Line

Do you know that British skies have been free of Hun raiders only 57 nights in 6 months. That one in every five homes have either been lost or damaged? That over 44,000 civilians have been killed and 50,000 injured in Oerman bombings?

Never theless the people of Britain are still taking it and the Battle of Britain is 'quiet' now only because it was 'hell' when it was at its worst.

Countless thousands of these people have been helped by the Canadian Red Cross. The Red Cross is the new crossroad from which many who were auddenly homeless, destitute and forlorn, start on their long journey back to normal ways of living.

Catholic Women's League

Miss Amelia Haley, Saint John, N.B., national convenor of war service, told the 22nd annual meeting of the Catholic Women's League in Montreal that \$18,772 had been donated in cash and

expended for Red Cross work. Mrs. H. R. Pleming, Humbolt, Bask. national convenor of citizenship, said that "it is very gratifying that the Catholic women are fully cognizant of their responsibilities to each other and the country to which they belong."

Prisoners-of-war Parcels

This is what Mrs. Theodore J. Monty, wife of Canada's Assistant Trade Commissioner to Norway at war's outbreak said after twenty-three anxious months she and her husband and children spent in Nazi custody:-"The Oerman rations—same as the Nam's own-were 'pretty bad', but Red Oross parcels arriving weekly since last July were a 'godsend'. Every sixth or eigh percel would be from Canada, and the quality of things in these parcels (the contents are standard) was better known than those packed in the Old Country, 'as can be caslly understood."


