LET'S USE OUR SUGAR WISLEY

Now that sugar rationing is here we must plan to get the most enjoyment and satisfaction possible out of the family allotment.

Fortunately, sugar is a completely pure food, is good for us no matter how we use it. Sugar is completely digestible and always gives full energy value whether it is used in cooked foods or simply added to our tea and coffee.

We Canadians are noted for our love of sweet things, and since sugar is a pure energy it may be more than a coincidence that we are noted for the way we can "get things done" too!

So let's do a job on our own nutrition program, we homemakers. Let's put our sugar to good use.

From now on the markets are going to be filled to overflowing with all kinds of fruit. Raspberries, new green apples, peaches, cherries, plums and gooseberries — they're bursting with the virtue of vitamins and minerals! But if they are to do us the most good we must enjoy them and to enjoy them we must add the clear sweetness of pure sugar thereby bringing out their finest flavor. How are we going to enjoy these summer fruits when our sugar supply is limited?

One way is to learn how to get the very most out of the sugar we use in cooking.

For instance when making a cherry pie, or any fresh fruit pie, blend the sugar with a little flour, cornstarch or tapioca and a little salt. Mix this with the fruit and let it stand while the pastry is being made. If you chill your pastry, prepare your fruit about 10 minutes before you are going to use it. You will need less sugar and you won't waste any of the juice that you want.

Another trick is to blend two fruits together — one needing less sugar than the other, such as strawberries and apple, strawberries and rhubarb, raspberries and gooseberry. When you are baking fruit, add a tiny pinch of salt, but no sugar until you have the fruit set aside and it has almost cooled. This way you can taste as you add — and you will be surprised how much less sugar is needed when the fruit is cool!
