Mrs. John Watkins Dies

Her many friends in Norval and district were saddened by the passing of Jane Gilchrist Clark, widow of the late John Watkins, at her home at Norval Station, on Thursday, July 23. Mrs. Watkins was born 78 years ago on the farm of her parents, James and Elizabeth Lyons Clark, in Chinguacousy Township. She received her primary schooling in the township and later attended Brampton and Streetville High Schools. After completing her secondary education, she trained for the nursing profession in the Providence, Rhode Island hospital and graduated in 1899. In September, 1901, she married the late John Watkins, and shortly afterwards they moved to their home near Norval Station, where they have resided ever since. The late Mr. Watkins was a coal merchant there for a number of years, and after his death, Mrs. Watkins successfully carried on the business until ill health forced her to retire. She has been a faithful member of the Presbyterian Church.

Three of her children, John, who is home at present, formerly of New York; Isobel at home, and her adopted daughter, Mrs. Batchelor, Assistant Superintendent of Woodstock Hospital, survive her. Another daughter, Elizabeth, predeceased her in 1937. She leaves one sister to mourn her loss, Mrs. Elizabeth Clark, at the farm in Chinguacousy.

The funeral was held from her late residence, Norval Station, on Saturday, July 25th, at 3 p.m. with Rev. A. Leggett, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Norval, conducting the services. Six nephews of the deceased were pallbearers: Messrs. Hugh, Arthur, Donald and James Clark, and John and Wilmer Watkins, of Acton. Interment was in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval.

Proclamation! Civic Holiday Monday, August 3rd

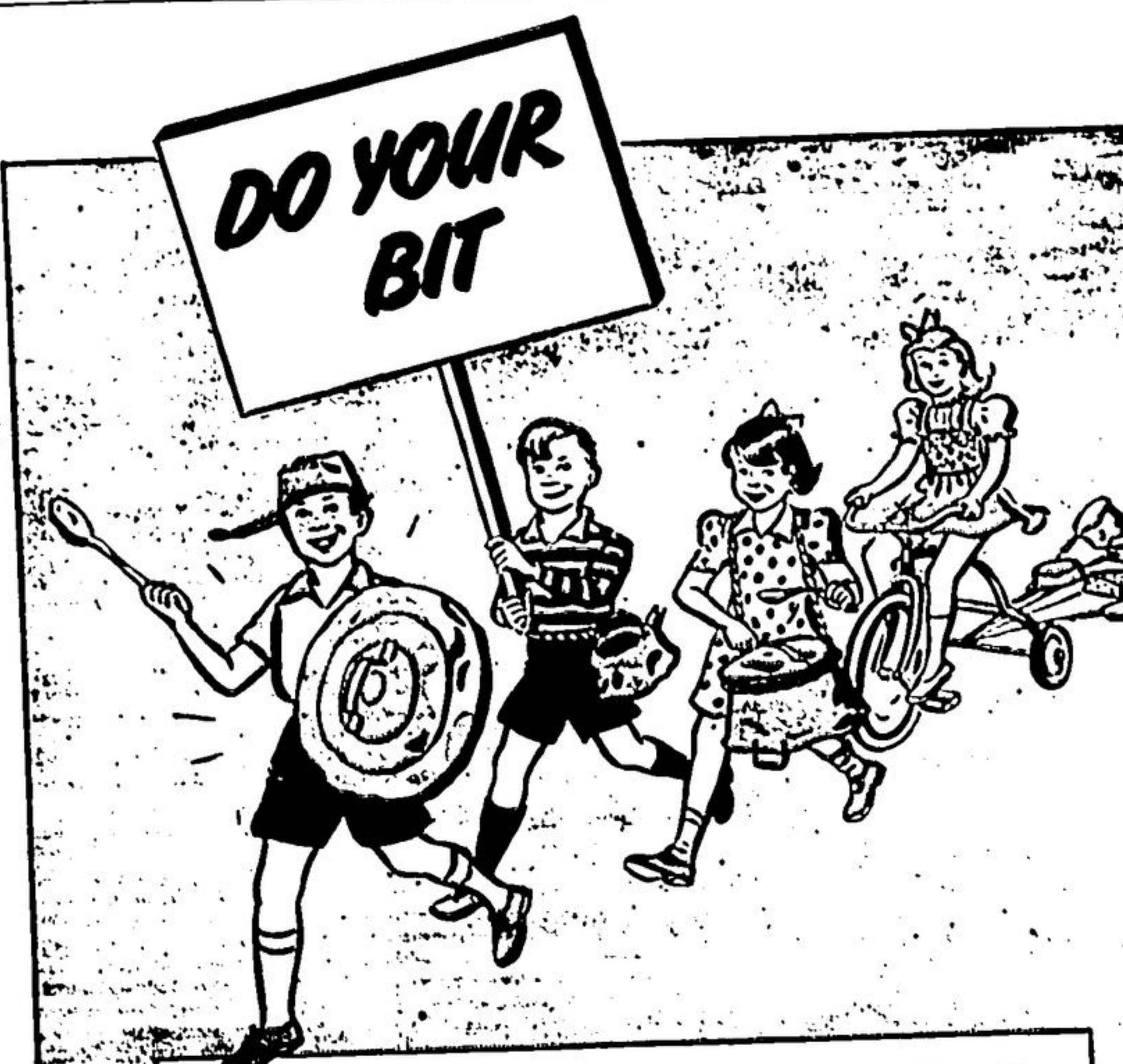
Whereas the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown have in former years set aside the first Monday in August as a Civic Holiday:
