LOCAL NEWS

—Let's put out our flags and bunting and welcome the Black Knights to Georgetown on August 15th.

—Mr. Keith Dolson, Norval, occupied the pulpit in the Oakville United Church on Sunday, July 26th, and gave a most up-to-date and interesting temperance address.

—It takes a lot of handkerchiefs nowadays to keep Mussolini supplied, says the Farmer's Advocate. They are the only things he can stick his nose into without asking Hitler.

—Saturday, August 15th, will be another big day for Georgetown, when Derry Day will be celebrated here by the Black Knights of Ontario.

—Attention ladies! The regular business meeting of the Lorne Scots W. A. will be held at the home of Mrs. Chris Sargent, on Thursday evening, August 6th.

—Miss Brulah Tompney, associate editor of the Brampton Conservator for the past year, left last week for Bowmanville, where she has accepted a position on the editorial staff of the Canadian Statesman.

—Dr. Frank B. Bull, F.R.C.S. of Gardiner, Maine, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. O. Bull, of Norval, has enlisted in the American Army Medical Corps, with the rank of Captain, and is stationed at Pickett, Virginia.

—A new public school will be built at Palermo to replace the one which suffered extensive damage during the storm of July 17th. The force of

the gale blew the roof off and demolished most of the walls. Until the new building is completed, classes will be held in St. Luke's Anglican church.

—Commencing August 15th, wage-earners not now receiving a cost-of-living bonus, will receive a 60c bonus weekly, excepting in the case of women earning less than \$25 a week, and under 21 earning less than that amount, who will receive an additional 2 1/2 per cent of their basic wage.

—We notice the bridal wreath bushes which flank the boulevards on Queen Street, have been trimmed down to half their size. It is due to the great assistance to motorists who were in constant dread of pedestrians darting out onto the road from behind one of the huge shrubs. The street looks ever so much neater, too, since its "trimming."

—Three thousand bushels of mixed grain in an elevator owned by G. A. Kennedy, of Hornby, were destroyed by fire Tuesday, July 28th. The fire was caused by a spark from a gasoline engine while a car of grain was being unloaded at the nearby C.P.R. railway. Milton fire brigade saved the carload of grain and nearby sheds.

—Fred Shaw, of Oakville, was elected president of the Ontario Volunteer Fire Fighters' Association at their convention held in Thorold South, over last week end. Other officers were: R. Kerr, Petrolia, 1st vice-president; Fred Bray, Brant, 2nd vice-president; Geo. Stirling, Humber Bay; secretary, and Thomas Wausley, Burlington, treasurer. The convention was the largest yet held by the Association.

—On display in the Herald window is a potato stock bearing two potato balls on the branch where the bloom usually is found. It seems that these potato balls are plentiful in England, but are seldom found on potato stocks in Canada. We are told that when the potatoes are ready to dig, the potato ball will drop off. The exhibit in the Herald window came from the garden of the Misses L. and O. Boomer, Main Street.

—The former Marion Erwin, of Brampton, returned home last week with her actor-husband, Francis Lederer, who will appear next week at the Royal Alexandra Theatre in Toronto in the play "No Time for Comedy."

—It was at this theatre two years ago that the Brampton girl went backstage to compliment the handsome Czech actor on his performance in the play in which he was appearing, and after a whirlwind romance they were married last year.

—Tea and coffee rationing went into effect on Tuesday, August 4th, which entitles each person over 12 years of age to one ounce of tea a week or four ounces of coffee—but not both. The Wartime Prices and Trade Board reminded Canadians they must not detach coupons from their tea and coffee ration cards except in the presence of the retailers from whom their supplies are bought. For the tea and coffee rationing, use is made of the "A-B-C-D-E" coupons on the top of ration cards previously used only for sugar.

—On Saturday, August 8th, the Counties of Brantmore Chapter, I.O.

D.M. will hold a Navy League Tag Day and asks the generous support of all citizens in this worthy project. The proceeds from the Tag Day will enable the League to carry on its work, which takes in the Sea Cadet movement, maintained in peace as well as war, and the providing of "comfort stations" or hostels at all Canadian ports, where men find recreational facilities, garments to offset exposure, ditty bags, playing cards, music, and the friendly atmosphere of a home away from home. 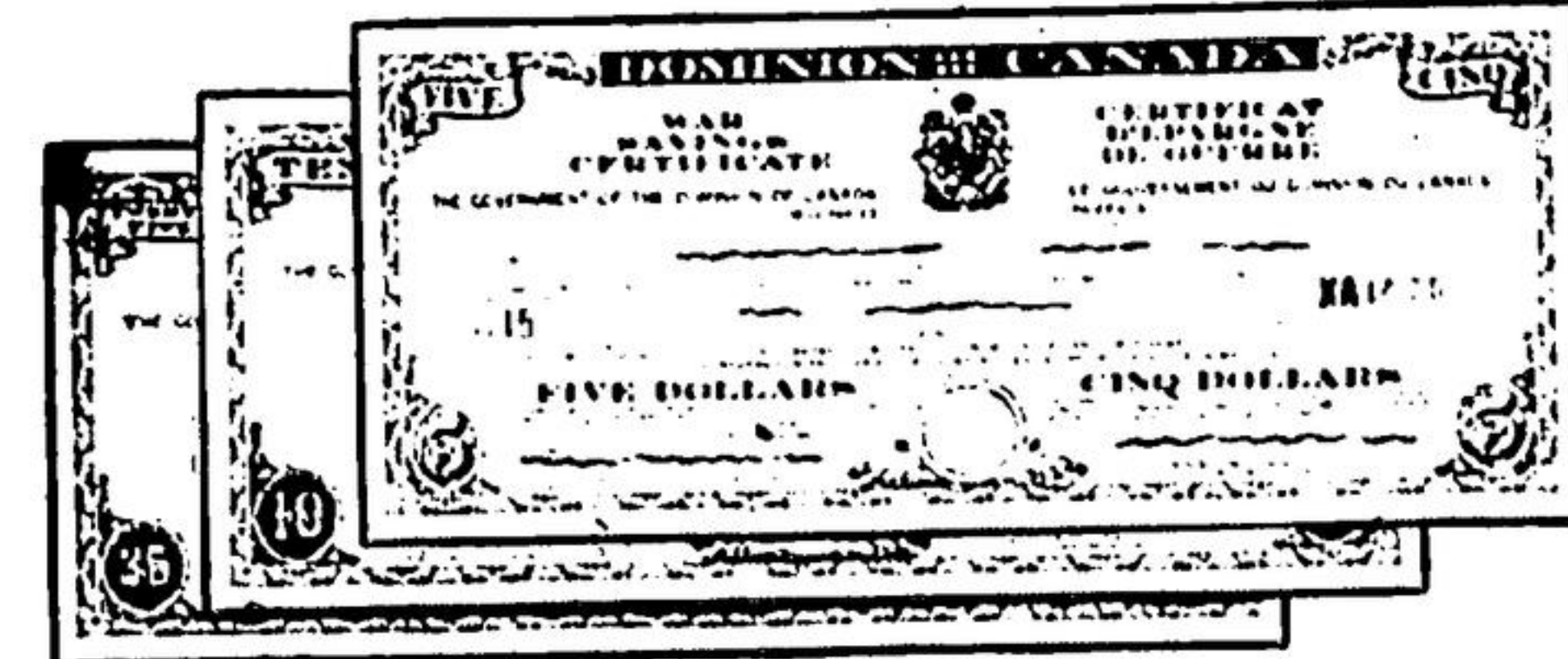
