Death Takes Noted Jurist, James Kelly

Youngest Ontario High Court Judge. 61 — Was M. C. in Last War in Long Year

The sympathy of the community is extended to Mr. J. D. Kelly, in the loss of his brother, Junior James Kelly, LL.B., who died August 10th in St. Michael's Hospital, at the age of 60. The youngest of Ontario high court judges, he was appointed four years ago. He had served with distinction in the Great War, winning the Military Cross.

For three terms he was chairman of the Toronto Separate School Board. He had been M. C. for several terms.

The son of James Kelly and Cecelia MacLennan, Justice Kelly was born at Chatham, Ont., on May 28, 1881. He attended the West Kent public school and Prince of Wales College at Chatham, Ont.

Coming to Toronto in 1909, he completed his studies at the University of Toronto, being graduated in political science from University College. He then recommenced the study of law at Osgoode Hall and after graduation in 1910 he practised law with Arthur Hordson, M. C. The following two years he practised with H. T. Harding, M. C., then becoming a partner with Louis Brayer, M. C., and T. Harding, M. C.

Joined in Great War

Justice Kelly had a fine record overseas in the Great War. He studied in the Spring of 1915 and served in England with the 15th Reserve Battalion and in France with the 20th Reserve Battalion. He was wounded at the battle of Amiens and for gallantry on the field he was awarded the Military Cross.

The law jurist took a keen interest in educational matters and in the eight years before his appointment to the bench he was a member of the Separate School Board, representing Ward Eight. He was chairman of the board 1936-8. He was the author of a number of important articles published in the Canadian Encyclopaedic Digest of Ontario Case Law, the top-ical being "Judgments and Orders," "Taxes and Trade Unions," and "Institutions."

He was a member of the Military Institute and of the Holy Name Society.

Married in 1922 to Margaret Simpson, Justice Kelly is survived by his wife and six children, Mary, Margaret, James, Gerald, Joseph, John and Peter. Another son, Thomas, died in infancy in 1932.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, Monday August 11th, requiring masses at the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help at 9 o'clock. Interment was in Mount Hope Cemetery.

Justice Kelly resided at 46 Ridge Drive.

His death is a great loss to the community, particularly to Catholic education. Said E. F. Henderson, secretary of the Separate School Board, today: "He was genuinely interested in the education and welfare of the children."

HALTON COUNTY COUNCIL REDUCES TAX RATE

work that needed to be done and in order to do it the rate would have to be raised by one-tenth since their road estimate was for \$60,000 of which the Department would pay only \$25,000. The question arose as to whether economies could be effected and whether they were in the public interest. The report of the committee was considered in detail and it was noted that a considerable amount of resurfacing was to be done. This, the chairman explained, was necessary and if postponed until next year would be a greater expense to the county in the long run. The report was finally passed.

Special Communications: This committee recommended that letters to the Children's Aid be read and filed. To letters referred to the following resolution passed by Peel County Council: — 1. "Resolved that Clause 3 of the Finance report passed on January 22, 1942, be rescinded, and in its stead a statement of expenditure of the Children's Aid Society, not covered by the rate per day for wards, be submitted monthly to the hospital committee of the County of Peel before being paid."

2. That the Clerk be instructed to Notify the Children's Aid Society that this Council wished to make a further study of the question of extra help for the organization and ask that this matter be held over until our November meeting."

With reference to the above Society, it was moved by Mr. McQuinn and seconded by Mr. Craig, of Halton County Council, "that expenditure incurred by the Children's Aid Society over and above rate received from wards be submitted to County Council in detail for discussion and passing before cheque is issued. Carried."

Hospital Accounts: This committee submitted accounts for payment that were particularly heavy and questions were raised as to their authenticity in some cases. Mr. Hillmer and Mr. Cleave agreed that some cases would bear looking into and expressed their intention of so doing. It was generally agreed that hospital accounts should be repaid by the recipient, if and when he was in the position to do so.

County Buildings:—This committee recommended that Allan Morely and Albert King be given \$25.00 each for their services in painting the County buildings and the residence of F. H. McIniven. It was noted that the offices of the County Clerk and County Treasurer had been greatly improved by being redecorated.

Reference was again made to the inconvenience of train service at Campbellville and Hornby with the result that the following resolution was passed:—Moved by Mr. Neave, seconded by Mr. Hillmer, that the clerk be instructed to write the Railway Board re train service to Campbellville and

Hornby owing to gasoline and tire shortage that they be requested to do it to the matter thoroughly as we have written to the CPR and have received no satisfaction.

Some discussion arose as to whether employees were liable under the Unemployment Insurance Act with the result that it was moved by Mr. Cullbert, seconded by Mr. Kerms, that the County take out unemployment insurance for their workmen.

A by-law was prepared and passed to levy a rate for the expenses for the current financial year, making a reduction in the county rate of one-tenth of a mill to that of last year.
