Change in Rules A slight change has been made in rule No. 5 in the Prize List, whereby an exhibitor was barred from taking Pollett. more than one prize in a class. The word "class" has been substituted by the word "section," and conveys an entirely different meaning. We reprint Rule No. 5 below, in order that we may convey the proper conception Sunday of the rule:-

"No person shall receive more than one prize in the same section nor shall any person enter or exhibit the same animal or article in two classes. The same exhibitor has the privilege of showing as many articles as he chooses, but can take but one prize and canexclude another exhibitor from taking second. No person shall receive more than one special prize on the same animal or article. Not more than one prize shall be awarded to animals of the same herd or flock, except in herd or team prizes."
