

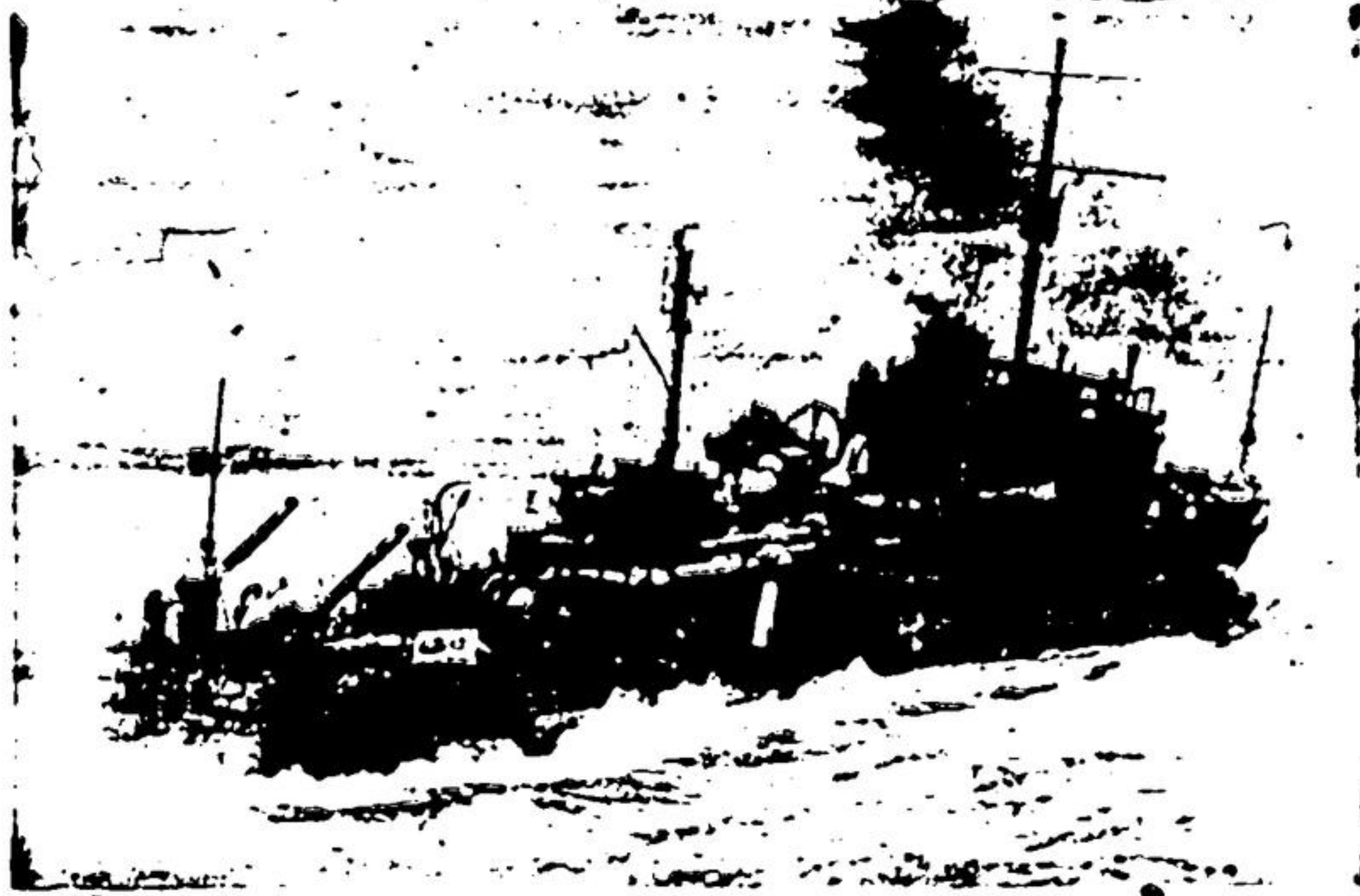

William Whyte Dies at Maple Ave. Home

On Friday morning, September 25th, Georgetown lost one of its oldest and highly respected residents by the passing of the late William Whyte, in his ninety-third year. A native of Canada, he was born in 1849 in the town of Toronto, Ontario, and lived in Georgetown for many years, retiring in 1908 with the rank of Sergeant. About this time he came to Georgetown and has resided here ever since. He was twice married. His first wife, was the late Margaret Noble Howitt, of Canada, and his second wife, the former Jane E. Sherman of this town. He was a life long member of the Methodist and United Church, and in politics a Conservative. Besides his wife he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Arthur Blight, of Toronto, and two sons, John W. of Toronto and P. O. of Orillia. The funeral on Monday was largely attended and was conducted in the home and at the graveside by the Rev. R. C. Todd of the United Church and the Rev. J. E. Ostrom of the Baptist Church. Five grandsons and a nephew acted as pall bearers and the burial took place in Park Lawn Cemetery, Toronto.

Although there has been light ground frosts for several mornings in succession the past week, it was not till Tuesday morning, the 29th of the month, that the mercury dropped down to 29 degrees and we got our first real cutting frost, that blackened the tomatoes and dahlias. We are still due for Indian summer and some fine warm days in October.
Our steady down pour of rain for two nights the end of last week brought the total for the month to 4.48 inches, nearly double the normal rainfall for the month. Third Victory Loan Opens October 5th.

At a meeting held in the Municipal building, Friday evening definite plans were set forth for the coming Third Victory Loan in Georgetown, which opens October 5th. The Halton County organizers, Mr. L. C. Amye and Mr. Reid, of Oakville, were present, and outlined details of the forthcoming loan.
While the meeting was well in advance of the opening of the loan itself, it was called as a means of getting the machinery into order and getting the committees working in co-ordination, and to appoint a general chairman of the campaign to replace Mr. W. V. Grant, who through illness finds it impossible to carry the responsibilities of this position for the Third Loan. In recognition of Mr. Grant's untiring efforts in the first two loans, he was made Honorary President for Georgetown District.
Replacing Mr. Grant as chairman, is Mr. W. F. Bradley, of Dominion Seed House, whose untiring efforts in the last two campaigns as publicity chairman, added greatly to their success. Mr. Bradley was hesitant in taking on this important part of the Third Victory Loan, but was assured full co-operation from the rest of the executive.
Mr. E. V. MacCormack, local druggist, was given the post of publicity chairman, while Mr. G. L. McElroy replaces Walter Birch on the same committee.
The appointment of the Canvass Chairman was left in the hands of the general chairman, as it was felt this important post should not be hurriedly filled. Mr. W. H. Long, who has handled canvass operations in previous loans, felt his time would not let him continue as head of the committee this year.

County Council Condemns Price Ceiling on Beef

SO LOW FARMER WON'T RAISE THE GOODS
County Council met at Milton on Tuesday, September 23rd. The War-time Prices and Trade Board, and Mr. Donald Gordon in particular, came in for a lot of lively discussion. Mr. Hillmer of Oakville, brought the matter before council, when he introduced a resolution condemning the War-time Prices and Trade Board for the low ceiling price on beef in Canada. He said the Board was entirely responsible for the beef situation today. The resolution is as follows: "That this council go on record as condemning the action of the War-time Prices and Trade Board on setting a ceiling too low a level on beef cattle to the primary producer and that the voice of agriculture be taken into consideration in preference to that of Canadian packers if the Board wants to encourage the increase of production of beef cattle, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to Mr. Donald Gordon, Chairman of the War-time Prices and Trade Board."
