

### Halton Holstein and Jersey Breeders Show at Milton

The backward season, shortage of labour and the unfavourable weather conditions on September 28 did not deter Halton Holstein and Jersey Breeders from staging outstanding cattle shows. In the Holstein Show, Durno Jones of Woodstock was official judge and as usual made his awards with the efficiency which always characterizes his work. Twenty-six Halton Breeders brought out a total of 97 black and white. W. B. Hall of Oakville was premier exhibitor and in addition had junior and grand championship on his junior and grand champion bull in the yearling sire Elm Colanthis Rag Apple Duke; 1st in the three year old female class on Abbotsford Rag Apple Duke; 1st prize senior yearling on Oakville Duke Alma; 1st in the open progeny of dam class on offspring of Abbotsford Rag Apple Duke; 1st in junior progeny of dam class on progeny of Abbotsford Rag Apple Duke, winning junior herd as well as many other awards. John Pickett and son of Hornby was premier breeder and incidentally won the Bank of Commerce Trophy on the top progeny bred and shown by the exhibitor. The same breeder won the art show class on Letore Totulla Rattler and also was a strong contender throughout. Special Dairy Cows, Hartog repeated her triumphs of former years by winning both senior and grand championships for females while Robros Eggs Abbotsford won the junior female championship. Robinson Bros also won the coveted Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy on their winning get of Leeholm Sir Teal. Ross Segsworth of Preman had the winning senior champion bull in Springbank Rag Apple France. Others winning first prize awards included: this yearling and sons on their junior heifer calf, LeStrange Coronation Rag Apple and Nelson A. In the Jersey show President Maurice Beatty led his fellow exhibitors and members by being both premier exhibitor and premier exhibitor. A total of 52 entries were judged for judge Oswald Worman of Brimpton, and while the numbers were considerably lower than a year ago, nevertheless, competition was keen throughout and reflects no little credit on the members of the Halton Jersey cattle club. In addition to the awards previously mentioned, President Beatty had the senior and grand champion bull in Brimpton Brimpton Royal, while Featherstone Bros of Oakville had the junior champion male in Avonlea Zana's Prince. In the class for cows, 4 years and over in milk, Arthur Padbury showed the winner with Rockdale Noble Lass with Brimpton winning the dry class on Lindale Standard Plasmight, 3rd. Beatty again repeated in the three year old classes, winning with Lindale Standard Blor-

son in the dry class and with Lindale Standard in the milking class. The latter animal later was declared senior and grand champion female. In the two year old class Featherstone Bros. Lona Lass with Beatty winning the milking two year old class on Lindale Royal Daydream.

Beatty again led the way in the senior yearling class with Rockdale Padbury Maud 4th and Beatty won the junior yearling class, Lindale Estelle Gladys. In the better calf class Lorne Ella and son's of Rockdale topped the sire class with the junior female champion Padbury again repeated on the get of Edw. W. Wilmot Volunteer with the T. Eaton Special going to Featherstone Bros for the best three animals bred and exhibited by exhibitor on the get of Silver Spring April King. Padbury topped the strong progeny of dam class, on the progeny of Lucinda Lily, while winning the Gratton and Co. Special, while Beatty won the Robert Simpson Eastern Special for the winning herd.
