THIRD CAMPAIGN SWINGS INTO ACTION THIS WEEK

With organization carried out effectively under the chairmanship of W. P. Bradley, the Third Victory Loan got underway this week to a fine start in Georgetown. Bond subscribers, with LeRoy Dale, K. O. as committee chairman, were on their rounds early Monday morning, and report sales coming in steadily. During the campaign every home in Georgetown and district will be canvassed, regardless of whether employees in local industry have contributed through the payroll deductions or not. It is to be hoped that the bond subscribers will be given a welcome in your home, and that your belt will be drawn in another notch—and that you purchase as large a bond as you possibly can.

The memory of our brave boys at Dieppe, still in our minds, Georgetown, with the rest of Canada, is out to raise, and exceed if possible, its quota of \$225,000. When this objective is reached, a Commando Digger will be sent to our boys overseas; at the same time impressing on us that our money spent on Victory Bonds is applied to the manufacture of weapons for our fighting forces.

Nothing that we can do can equal the sacrifice of the men of Dieppe. We must back our boys to the limit by working harder, spending less, and lending every last dollar to buy planes, tanks, guns and ships.

A Letter from Halton Victory Loan Chairman



MAJOR FRANK PULLEN

TO THE CITIZENS OF HALTON COUNTY:

It is perhaps not necessary to remind you that we are now faced with a duty of vital importance, the raising of our apportionment of the Third Victory Loan, the total of which is the greatest ever attempted in the Dominion of Canada.

The allotment for our County of Halton has been considerably increased over previous Loans, as is the case in all other communities, and it will require the greatest effort and considerable sacrifice on the part of all of us if we are to succeed.

As Citizens of the County of Halton we have good reason to be proud of our previous record in all patriotic undertakings, and I think I am correct in stating that on the basis of population there is no other district in the Dominion of Canada that can exceed our record for the numbers serving in the armed forces, or in the amount subscribed for any patriotic purpose. Such being the case we must have no thought of failure at this time.

Those of us who are not privileged on account of age or physical handicap to serve in the armed forces can perform some small part of the obligation that rests on all of us to defend all that makes life worth living by lending our money to support those who have willingly offered their lives in our defence.

Many of those who have gone from this community have already made the supreme sacrifice and have given their lives that we may live in reasonable comfort, the least that we who are left can do is to LEND our money in order that their heroism may not be in vain.

The men who have given their lives or their liberty at Hong Kong, Dieppe, in the Air Force, the Navy and the Merchant Marine faced impossible odds without a thought of flinching or failure. Can we not emulate in some small degree their splendid record?

The threat to our National life is greater than many suspect. This is proven by the events of the past few days through the loss of life due to submarine activity on the East Coast, and if we are to survive it will only be through a supreme effort on the part of all of us.

The utmost we can lend is the least we can do. There can be no Victory without pain, no peace without sacrifice, only those who are willing to deny themselves deserve to win.

I appeal to all to forget selfish interest and to support this effort to the very limit of your ability.
