

Red Cross Elects Some New Officers

A special meeting of the Red Cross was held in the A. O. U. Hall of the Public Library on Wednesday evening, October 14th at eight o'clock. A good representation of the different Women's organizations in town and vicinity was present, the primary object of the meeting being to elect officers to the vacancies that had occurred during the summer months.

Mr. LeRoy Dale, K.C., President of the Red Cross was chairman. In a brief but potent address he stressed the necessity of active and continued Red Cross work in Georgetown, saying in part that the Red Cross was a world-wide organization having local, provincial and Dominion branches with the International at Geneva. He spoke of the wonderful work the Red Cross is doing in seeking information of prisoners of war. There were 200,000 in the Red Cross in support of the Army and Navy in the Pacific and Asia. He spoke of the work of the Red Cross in building up the men on the battlefield, and of the first consideration of the Red Cross in the front line. We must be prepared to do our part when the call comes. He applied to the audience for their cooperation and aid in our work.

At a previous meeting the resignation of Mrs. P. B. Coffin had been read and deep regret had been expressed and a thankful tribute paid to her devoted service to the Red Cross since it had been organized. This left the office of First Vice-president vacant and Mr. Roy Watson, who has also served with distinction in this office. He cited a story of a meeting Mrs. Roger Gaulty removal from Glen Williams left the office of third vice-president vacant and Mrs. John Hepburn, of Glen Williams was elected to his office. Mrs. W. Bell was elected Chairman of the Sewing Committee and a letter of recognition of the work of the Red Cross was expressed. Mrs. J. R. Davison Field Secretary of the Navy League of Canada, was present and can be asked to say a few words which would shorten the war by a few weeks or even a few days.
