Canada's radio production ranks manned by noticeably youthful veterans of whom Mayor Moore is an outstanding example. He was born in 1913 but his unusual gifts have already brought distinction to the Canadian theatre, to the fields of play writing, acting, and directing. He has been identified for the past three years with many of the leading CBC war service feature broadcasts under the supervision of J. Frank Willis, first as actor and, in more recent months, as producer. His most important assignment at present is producing "Command in Arms" the Friday night programme (October 30, 10:15 p.m. EDT, 11:15 p.m. ADT) in which the Canadian Army, the Royal Canadian Navy and the R.C.A.P. unite to tell the story of their endeavour. He will produce "Naz, Evils on Canada", starting on a Wednesday, Sunday, October 25, 7:30 p.m. EDT, 8:30 p.m. ADT.

Large Legion Funerals For Albert Joseph Smethurst

The largest Legion funeral ever held in this community marked the passing of Albert Joseph Smethurst, a highly respected resident of Limehouse and veteran for forty years. Mr. Smethurst died in Christie Street Hospital, Toronto, on October 29th, 1942, after a short illness, although he had not been well for some time. He was born in Scarborough, England, September 16th, 1878, the second son of Joseph Henry Smethurst and Christina Brodie. In his youth he was apprenticed to Dennis and Holloway Stationers, Scarborough, England and in 1898 he joined the firm of Passon and Bradford Stationers, Sheffield, England. He remained with them until he came to Canada July 29th, 1903.

When he came to this country he resided for some years in Sturtevant and Georgetown, before moving to Limehouse in March, 1910, where he was employed with the Toronto Lime Company. In 1912 he married M. Ethel Appaee, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Appaee of Sturtevant. Three years later he entered the employ of the Acton Tannery Co. and in February, 1916, he enlisted with the 164th Battalion. He was transferred to the 115th Battalion on active overseas service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. In September 1919 he was discharged with the rank of CSM.

Upon his return to Canada in October he was employed again with the Acton Tannery Co. until 1935, when in July, 1940 he came to Georgetown under Master J. R. Barth's invitation and resided at the home of his position here until October 29th, 1942.
