The regular meeting of Esqueuing Township Council was held on Monday afternoon. All members were present and Reeve C. H. May presided. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

After the communications were read accounts were passed. Moved by Currie, seconded by Murray, that the following accounts be paid: Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Co., renewal policy on house at Sturwinton, \$4.00; Bell Telephone Co. services, \$3.77; Georgetown Herald account, \$25.72; C. H. May, Cecil Chisholm, A. W. Benton and I. M. Bennett, collecting fares, \$5.90; Cecil Chisholm, a reading, Judge Court re Voters' list and mileage, \$6.55; A. W. Benton, attending Judge Court re Voters' list and mileage, \$6.60; Mrs. Viola Milham, to cleaning Council Chamber and supplies, \$3.25; J. Hamilton, 2 qts. Boy's oil, \$4. H. Robertson, stamps, \$6.00.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Wilson, that Board of Health accounts be paid, Dr. C. K. Myers re treatment to patient No. 10, June 20th, to September 19th, \$21.00; L. O. Wallace, Funeral Home, Ltd., funeral of indentured \$30.00; Hates A. Danks, funeral of indentured \$30.00—Carried.

Moved by Murray, seconded by Currie, that the road accounts be paid—\$1463.31—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Currie, that the treasurer be authorized to accept \$11.25 in payment of the six months interest coupon due October 1st, 1942 for \$22.50 on Bond No. 3777, Province of Alberta for \$1,000 held on account of the Railway Bonus Fund—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Wilson, that Canadian Legion, Post 123, be paid the sum of \$10.00 for Poppy Day Fund—Carried.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Currie, that Helms' accounts amounting to \$68.68 be paid—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Murray, that George O. Brown be paid insurance to Tap Hall through the Federal Fire to Nov. 18th, 1942, \$20.00, Fire and Theft Insurance on Tap grader, through the General Accident to Nov. 18th, 1942, \$79.85—Carried.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Murray, that grants be paid to the Acton Agricultural Society, \$25.00—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Currie, that Dale A. Bennett, be paid on account, \$150.00—Carried.

Moved by Wilson, seconded by Currie, that in accordance with the provisions of the Unemployment Insurance Act the following be rated as permanent employees of the municipality and that certificates of permanency be asked for: Cecil Chisholm, Arthur W. Benton—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Currie, that leave be granted to introduce a By-law for the appointment of a collector for the Township of Esqueuing, in the case of Marshal versus Township of Esqueuing, having been read a first time be now read a second time and third time and passed, and the blanks filled in with the name of Haines, A. Haines and the seal of the Corporation attached thereto—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Murray, whereas this council has been advised that the bus service from Toronto to London is to be discontinued except from Toronto to Brimpton, and whereas this service is essential to the Village of Norval, the town of Georgetown and the village of Acton, as all of the above mentioned places do most of their business in the City of Toronto, which is the centre for this district, and whereas the village of Norval is entirely without bus service. This council is unanimously of the opinion that the bus service should be continued as far as the village of Acton—Carried.

Moved by Currie, seconded by Murray, that we adjourn to meet Tuesday, December 15th, at 10:00 a.m., at the call of the Reeve—Carried.
