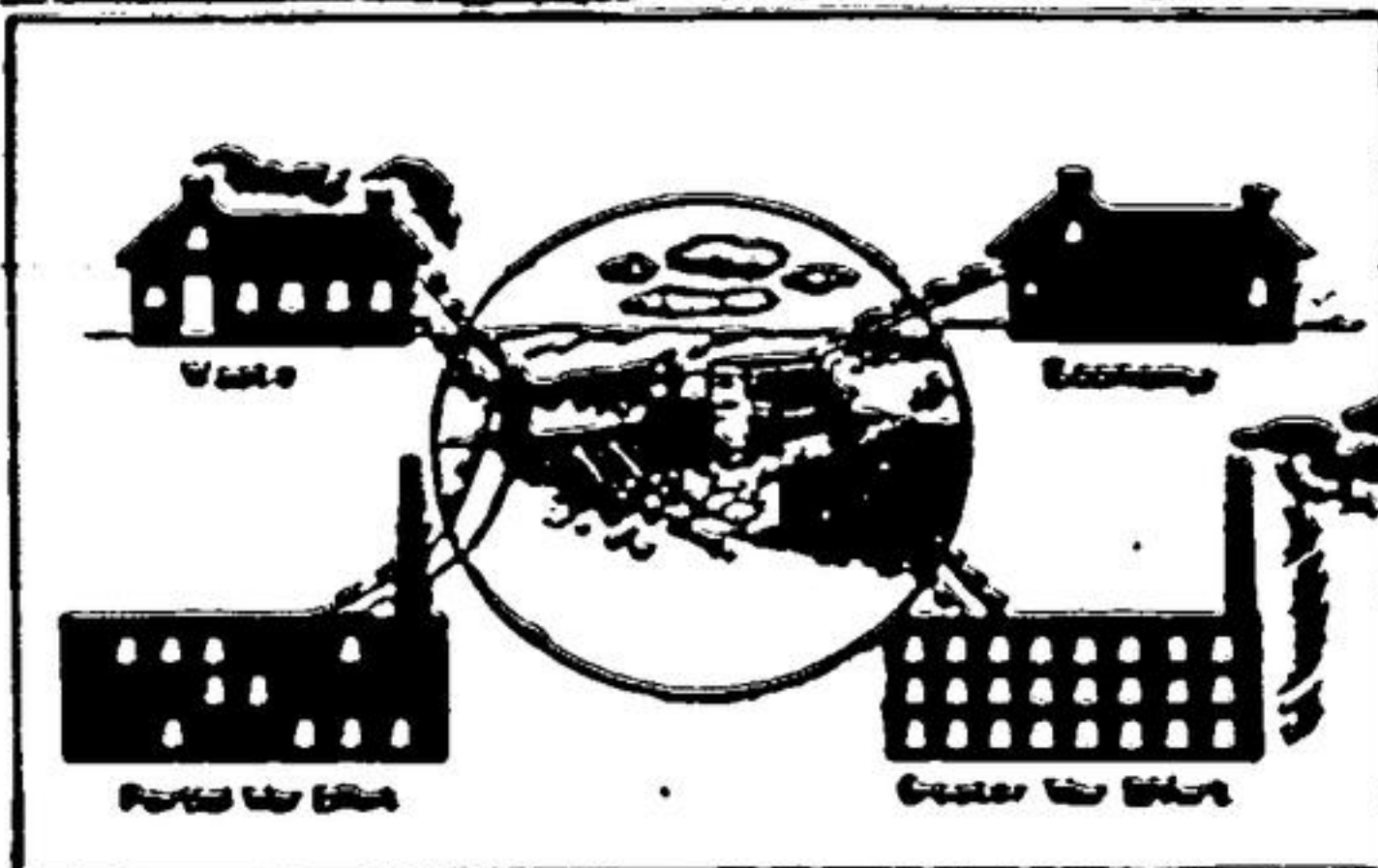

How to Conserve Hydro Power



This illustration, released by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, graphically portrays the importance of voluntary conservation of electricity on the part of domestic consumers.

Parties are working 24 hours a day, ceaselessly turning out munitions and equipment to back up our men in the firing line, and ample electric power must be available at all times for this vital production job.

If industrial electrical equipment is operated two or three times as many hours per day as under peacetime conditions it will consume two or three times the number of kilowatt-hours of energy. To supply this additional energy the turbines in the generating station will require larger quantities of water every day.

What is known as the peak demand for power usually occurs on dark winter afternoons when the lighting load comes on to fire certain factories that close for the day. In some cities the daily peak demand occurs just before noon when the housewives are preparing the midday meal on their electric ranges. Even if a hydro-electric generating station is equipped to supply the extra power required to meet the peak demand, there still may not be enough power available to keep the turbo-generators running near top capacity for many extra hours per day.

Thus under war conditions the saving of energy by economical and careful management in the home is an essential and valuable contribution to the war effort.

THIS BUTTER SHORTAGE—Until the butter situation improves we have asked our stores to limit their sales to a 1/2 lb. per order, because we are unable to get the amount of butter we require. We would be very glad if we could give you every pound you ask for. But we are being rationed by our supplier, therefore we are obliged to ration our customers. Meanwhile, be as patient as you can. And please do not blame the clerks in our stores. They are trying to obey our orders and to do their best in a difficult situation. We have no stocks of butter in storage, but purchase daily from creameries all they can give us. Just as soon as we can get more it will certainly be in our stores for sale.

THE PRICE OF ORANGES—Last week-end newspapers and radio carried announcements that there would be a drastic reduction in the retail price of oranges. Of course consumers expected a reduction in price to go into effect first thing Monday morning. Actually all reductions had previously taken place due to market declines and the removal of the duty on oranges on December 1. Since November 2 of this year there has been a decline of from 10c to 15c a doz. in our orange prices. Any further declines in cost will be followed immediately by decline in retail prices.

TEA AND COFFEE—In accordance with the W.T.P.B. regulations the prices of all brands of Teas and Coffees have been dropped in our stores... 10c a lb. on Tea and 4c a lb. on Coffee, with a corresponding decline on smaller packages.
