Since our 1942 greetings arise from the act that also ever present in this fallen world, has in our time overflowed its accustomed bounds.

As I understand it, a Christmas greeting is always a sort of echo of the Christian message. The Christian Gospel tells us that we on earth have peace with God through faith in His Son. A truly Christmas greeting ought then to be a prayer that, being reconciled to God, we shall be reconciled also one to another.

The Peace of Christmas

The prophets of the Old Testament moved through the world of their day with something of the far-off look of men who were seeking the coming of good-tidings. Gradually their vision concentrated on one event—the coming of the Messiah. "Lo, this is our God; we have waited for Him, and He will save us."

And so when the promise was fulfilled, and the truth finally revealed it was to men who had learned to wait—to the shepherds keeping watch by night, to Wise Men searching for His Star, to Simon and Anna in the temple praying for the consolation of Israel.

Thus at this Christmas-tide men wait and hope for a good to come. But they wait with a confidence and hope far above that of the prophets of Old-time. For they have the knowledge of a Christ who has come and entered into the life of men. And it is this fact that is the secret of courage.

The angel bade the men and women upon the earth to "fear not." It was a message that had come in the form of a Person—and as the awed faces of men looked upon the cradle of a little Child, they whispered: "This is our God." And peace entered upon their souls—the peace of the first Christmas. It is that Peace which shall be ours today.
