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RESOLUTIONS FOR CANADIANS FOR 1943

1. To serve my country at war to the best of my ability.
2. To make sure that my occupation is the one open to me in which I can best serve Canada's cause; then to work at it with all my might and main.
3. To trim down my wants so that I make less demands on goods and services available in Canada, and so leave more for the war.
4. To save in every way and to lend the product of my economies to the Government as War Bonds or War Savings Certificates.
5. To be particularly sparing of the things which are essential to the war, such as gasoline, rubber, metals, etc.
6. To waste as little material of all kinds, either at home or at work as possible, and to make no unnecessary demands on the time and energy of others.
7. To co-operate with Government Rationing and Price Control Boards and to connive at no violation of the regulations.
8. To keep healthy, and to keep others healthy by following good advice about nutrition and sensible living habits.
9. To take a keen but calm interest in the course of the war, but not to listen to rumours, and especially not to pass them on.
10. To try and understand Canada's war effort, to take full pride in it, to criticize it only with reason, and to cease before criticizing it that my own war record is the best possible.
11. To encourage and help the efforts of other people. If not able to join a uniformed service myself to do everything in my power to make it easier for others, and to make their lives cheerful under arms.
12. To do everything in my power to make a better Canada and a better world in the future.
