## Ships Lack Sail Yet Need Needles



CANADIAN wartime cargo ships go to sea equipped with a thousand and one items which actually range from needles to anchors. The latter have an obvious use but why the needles for vessels 'taking sail'? They are used in deck and engine rooms stores for sewing canvas covers, boat covers and hatch tarpaulins and with the needles go sailmakers' palms, stout pieces of leather fitted into the palm to drive the needle through the cloth, a job rather beyond the housewife's thumb.

These objects remote in the scale of ship's stores are obtained by the Purchases and Stores Department of the Canadian National Railways which is responsible for requirements of Canada's new cargo ships built for wartime purposes. Ships need a lot of things from food to fuel and the pictures illustrate some features of the job. The upper photograph shows a Canadian National truck bringing stores to the s.s. "Jasper Park", one of the new Made in Canada war freighters. Lower right gives a glimpse of the storeroom at an "Eastern Canadian Post" stocked with necessities from foods to tools, lubricants and material for fighting incendiary bombs on deck. Lower left shows a storeman holding a package of sail needles and the register of a ship's log by means of which the speed and distance travelled are recorded.



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
