ACTON RESERVE NEW WARDEN FOR COUNTY OF MILTON

(Continued from Page One) Special Communications - New. Brown, Keith, Hillier, Guelph Roads-Gilbert, May, New. Robertson, Heapel. High School Board appointments were made for 1943 to 1945 as follows: Milton, Ed Mahon; Oakville, Reg. M. Smith; Burlington, Gordon J. Campbell; Mr. Gilbert and Mr. Campbell were appointed as representatives from county council on the Children's Aid Society Board for 1943. The Reserve Harold Grove, of Georgetown, whose term on the Good Roads Committee had not expired, was replaced by Alex. Near, of Nassagoyville, for the years 1943-45. Dr. Heapel, of Milton, was appointed to the same committee for the years 1943-47. Commissioners to the House of Refuge for 1943 are Warden J. M. McDonald and ex-Warden John Blair, of Burlington. The committee on printing called for tenders for printing 100 copies of the minutes, 100 copies of the auditors report. Time limit placed at January 15th, 1944. The following by-laws were introduced, given three readings and passed: 1-To appoint auditors of the accounts for 1943. 2-A by-law to authorize the borrowing of money to meet the expenditures for the year 1943. 3-A by-law to introduce members of the County Board of Audit. 4-A by-law to provide for the total expenditures on the system of county roads for 1943. It was moved by Gilbert and Heapel that a rate of 10c per mile travelled for county purposes be paid to councillors.-Carried. Moved by Heapel and Gilbert: That \$345.74 hospital accounts be paid.-Carried. The Warden handed to each member of the council a brief of the Rural "Pay-as-You-Go" plan and asked them to give it their serious consideration. This was done in accordance with a request from the rate-payers of the Village of Acton.
