Boxes are to be sent local overseas men during the month and khaki yarn is to be obtained if possible for further knitting.

Correspondence was read from two soldiers who had received cigarettes, sent through the Overseas League Tobacco Fund, and from two sailors, who received ditty bags from us, one of them filled by Mrs. Glisby and Mrs. Norrie. Mrs. A. J. Smethurst had current events. Mrs. E. Miller the motto "The World is Taking Your Picture, Look Pleasant, Please," and Mrs. B. Wright a paper on "Community Activities" in which she stressed neighbourliness. Following the National Anthem an enjoyed cake and tea served by Mrs. Glisby and Mrs. Norrie.

Rev. O. O. Cochrane was chairman at the annual meeting of Limehouse Presbyterian Church held at the home of Mr and Mrs. A. W. Benton on the evening of Feb. 3rd, twenty people attending. Reports read by the treasurers of the different organizations were very encouraging and showed a splendid year's work, with a substantial balance on hand for 1943.

Auditors for 1943 were appointed—Joe Ross and Donald Lindsay. J. N. Newton and Harvey McDowell, the retiring managers were re-appointed for three years. Stewards Frank Benton and J. N. Newton were re-appointed, also, as was treasurer A. W. Benton. Four young men were appointed ushers, namely, Bill O'Brien, Wallace Gordon, Donald Lindsay and Gordon Price.

Gifts of \$1000 to the organist, Mrs. H. Norton, in appreciation of her services, \$1000 extra for the caretaker, Wallace Gordon, and \$25.00 to Rev. C. C. Cochrane to aid with his travelling expenses were voted. The pastor opened the meeting with devotional exercises and closed with the benediction. Cakes and tea were served by the Ladies.

Knox Church Annual

The congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church convened at the annual meeting on Monday evening to hear reports of the year's work. Worship was conducted by the Minister, the Rev. Chas. C. Cochrane, after which, in the chairman's address, Mr. Cochrane revealed that in many respects, the financial progress made in the past year exceeded anything reported in many years. Contributions to Missions were substantially larger than for the past ten years, support of the local church increased more than twenty-seven percent over the previous year, and the Women's Association showed a very favourable balance after having a set aside a considerable sum for the eventual redecoration of the church building. All departments of the work were shown to have surpassed anything reported for some years.

Mr. Cochrane expressed his appreciation to those who by word or deed had made the reports possible, and commended to the congregation the pastoral letter printed in the annual report. The chairman then revealed that, upon becoming eligible in September, he had applied for an appointment in the Chaplaincy Service, his application being considered by the Church's Committee set up for that purpose. The application had not, however, been accepted, and had been withdrawn forthwith. Mr. Cochrane stated that he had applied not because he wished to leave Knox Church, but because he wished to place himself on record as being willing to serve in the armed forces if they should so desire. In this action the minister had taken only the Clerk of Session into his confidence, lest the period of uncertainty be detrimental to the congregation.

The reports were then adopted as printed, and nominations to the Board of Managers called for. The meeting appointed Mr. Cecil Doble, Treasurer, and elected Messrs. B. J. Mackenzie, George Henderson, and Eccles McClure to the Board. Miss Janet McDougall was re-elected Missionary Treasurer, and Miss Jean McDonald and Mrs. Herb. Harlow joint stewards. The chairman was then asked to leave the

meeting during which time the congregation voted Mr. Cochrane a generous purse in view of his work with the choir during the past year. After the benediction, pronounced by the minister, light refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregation.
