BISHOP LAUDS FINE EXAMPLE OF RED CROSS
Addressing the 26th annual meeting of the Toronto Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society, Bishop R. J. Denton declared that if it were not for the spiritual and kindly aid of the human race, as exemplified by the Red Cross Society, "we might as well call it a day."

There have always been a few kind people, Bishop Denton said. There was a society of kind people in Jerusalem who provided an anesthetic for Christ on the Cross. The Red Cross Society is one of those things that show that man has not altogether forgotten where he came from.

Thanks to the Red Cross workers and people like them throughout the universe, it would be possible to make a post-war world fit to live in, the Bishop said.

JUNIOR RED CROSS
Her Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth is a patroness of the Junior Red Cross Society in Canada. The following letter was received by the organization, written by her own hand and dated at Buckingham Palace.

A Patroness of the Junior Red Cross Society in Canada, I send to all members my warmest congratulations upon the wonderful contribution they have made in money, clothing and other gifts toward the many war needs in Great Britain to-day.

I was especially interested to hear about the fourteen residential nurseries which the members are supporting over here, also the fourteen mobile canteens which are doing so much to add to the comfort and welfare of the National Fire Service. In raising the very large sum of 1000 Pounds Sterling to be spent in Great Britain as well as abroad, your generous work for support, indeed, the Junior Red Cross members of Canada have set a fine example of living up to their motto "Serve One Another" and I am most proud to be their Patroness.

The latest recruits to enroll in the Junior Red Cross are the Lomas five from Colander—the Quints. This week Marie, Yvonne, Emily, Cecile and Annette signed their names to the enrolment form, promising that they would do their best to keep the tide of health and to help others who need their help.

They are now proudly wearing the Junior Red Cross button already being worn by more than 300,000 Ontario School children.

We have a very active Junior Red Cross in our Public School here who have helped the senior branch in many ways. Because of sickness their activities have been more or less curtailed for the past couple of months.

PRISONER-OF-WAR PARCELS
How did this branch of our work start? The story opens at the outbreak of war when Germany blandly announced that Allied prisoners of war would receive 1,000 calories a day, less than half the amount required by any normal man. Shocked, the British Red Cross Society set about supplying parcels of precious food to British prisoners through the International Red Cross, Geneva.

After the battle of France, when 50,000 British soldiers were captured, the British appealed for help from Canada.

Result: On Jan. 6, 1943, exactly two years after the first box was packed, the Red Cross announced 496,064 acknowledgment cards had been received from 162 different camps.

THIS WILL BE HARD TO BEAT
Arthur LaMotte kept an appointment with a Red Cross blood bank in Buffalo, N. Y. by walking 5 1/2 miles on crutches. He refused an offer of a ride home.

FROM HEADQUARTERS
Comes an appeal—something the women of Ontario can do for the women of Great Britain who are in uniform. These brave women are not only mending defence guns but manufacturing search light batteries, operating anti-air radars, and using field telephones in order to release the men to do a live service.

But they are 42 women and they lack what is hard to obtain in Britain, and what once considered luxuries but now considered needed comforts. Imagine not being amply supplied with toilet soap, tooth brushes, tooth paste, laundry soap, cold cream, hair nets, Kleenex, tape lines, combs, face powder, lip, tick, hair pins, bobby pins, safety pins, straight pins.

Some time in the near future our local branch is planning a shower of these articles. We think this should appeal to all. It is the most natural thing in the world for a woman to want to appear at her best and we hope you will all do your part to see that our British sisters are given an opportunity to do just that.
