Many Attend Brampton-Newmarket Game Here Tuesday

An exciting O. H. A. group play-off hockey fixture took place at the Georgetown Arena on Tuesday evening. A large crowd was on hand for the affair, and the influx of soldiers and their band added greatly to the interest in the game.

The two teams from Army training centres at Brampton and Newmarket were leaders in their O.H.A. group, and this was the first game of a two-game series with goals to count on the round. The teams were very evenly matched, as is evidenced by the 2-2 score.

The game was fast with plenty of brilliant hockey, plays and stick-handling. Brampton lead the game 2-1 in the final period, but Newmarket out-guessed them to even the count before the end of the game.

Speaks at United Church



REV. J. M. MUTCHMOR, D. D.

Dr. Mutchmor was born in Ontario, took Arts Course in Toronto and Theology in Union Theological Seminary, N. Y., where he also got his M.A. in Economics at Columbia University.

He was overseas four years serving most of that time as a combatant in Canadian Artillery, in which service he was wounded. He was ordained in 1922 and served in Winnipeg from that time until 1936. About thirteen years of that time he was at Robertson Memorial Church and House and the remainder at John Black Memorial Church.

From 1926 to 1936 Dr. Mutchmor was Secretary of the Welfare Supervision Board of the Province of Manitoba. From 1934 to 1936 he was Chairman of the Child Welfare Board of the same province.

He was appointed Associate Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the United Church of Canada in 1936 and came to Toronto at the beginning of 1937. He was made Secretary of the Department by the General Council meeting in Toronto, 1938, succeeding Rev. D. N. McLachlan, D. D.

Since the War, he has been Joint Secretary of the War Service Committee and Chairman of the Chaplaincy Committee of the United Church of Canada. These duties are in addition to his work as Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service.

He will be guest preacher at the United Church on Sunday morning, March 7th.

Old Time Glen Lacrosse Player Dies

William Martin died suddenly in Brampton on Sunday, February 21st in his 69th year.

Born in Ireland, he was one of a family of eight to come over to this country as young children, and settle in Glen Williams. He worked for several years in Beaumont's Woolen Mill, and was one of the old time lacrosse players for the Glen team. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, some years after he left Glen Williams, his health failed him, and he returned to live in Brampton, where he died. The late Mr. Martin was unmarried.

Of the family, only one sister is left to mourn his loss, Mrs. Mary MacKenzie, of Los Angeles, California.

The funeral service was held from the home of H. C. McClure, Maple Ave. on Wednesday at 2:30 o'clock. Mrs. William and Matthew Beaumont, George Cooper, and Leonard Marchant were pall bearers. Rev. W. O. Thompson conducted the service. Interment was made in the Williams Cemetery.

THE WEATHER

Since the winter of 1934, when we had a subzero temperature for twenty out of the twenty-eight days in the month, we have rather dreaded the month of February. However, when we look back on the past month we can congratulate ourselves we got off very nicely, for shortly after the coldest day, when our thermometer recorded 27 below we had nearly a week of fine mild weather that took off most of the snow, and only four times during the month was it below zero. Our figures show that on the whole the average daily temperature was 27 degrees above normal. And the snow fall which was so heavy earlier in the winter was 10 inches below normal for the month. 20-YEAR OLD BRITISH V. C. WIDIED TO SAVE AIR CREW



Lieutenant Leslie Thomas Martin, who was awarded the 50th V. C. of this war, posthumously. He was the "Canadian pilot" of an R. A. F. "Manchester" bomber taking part in the "Dambusters" raid on Cologne. His bomber was hit by anti-aircraft fire while approaching the target, he nevertheless held on his course, enabling the crew to bomb heavily and accurately. Hit again and again on the home journey, he carried on until with his port engine on fire the plane was almost impossible to handle. Then, refusing his own parachute, he gave orders to the crew to abandon the aircraft, keeping it steady in order that they might do so safely, and then crashing. The crew are now ascertained to be prisoners of war.
