In an address to the Canadian Club at Quebec on March 3rd, Navy Minister Macdonald said in part: "The battle against the submarine is not won. Indeed, there seems to be every indication that this year the enemy will make a more determined attempt than ever against our commerce; but you may rest assured of this — the Allied navies are not overlooking anything which may contribute to the winning of the battle against submarines. This year we will have stronger defenses along our shore, and more ships for escort work than we had last year. The enemy did not win in 1941 or 1942, he cannot win in 1943 or 1944. We were unprepared for war. We now are getting into the full swing of preparedness. Our strength is growing, while the enemy would seem to have already reached, and probably passed his peak of strength. We may still have to face dark days, and some disappointments BUT BEYOND AND ABOVE THEM ALL WE CAN SEE THE GLEAM OF VICTORY! AND THE GLITTER OF TRIUMPH!"

The dark days for the Navy are when their ships are torpedoed and the dark days for the Navy League would be if they had not sufficient to clothe the survivors of those torpedoed ships, when they reach shore.

WILLIAM J. SHARPE BURIED AT NORVAL

A highly respected resident of the Cheltenham district passed away Wednesday, February 24th, in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, in the person of William John Sharpe. He had been ailing for a lengthy time, but despite his illness he was always ready to greet his many relatives and acquaintances whom he had met during his life-long stay at Cheltenham. The late Mr. Sharpe was born seventy years ago in the immediate vicinity of where he passed away, and was a son of the late John and Eliza McLean Sharpe, two of the early pioneers of the Cheltenham district. All his life he carried on the occupation of farming until he was compelled to give up strenuous work owing to being ill most of the time. In religion the late Mr. Sharpe was of the United faith, and at the time of his passing was connected with Cheltenham United Church, and all his life was a staunch Liberal. He also held office as school trustee for a number of years, and always took a keen interest in the affairs of his community.

The late Mr. Sharpe is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Sharpe, and two sons, Gordon and Fred Sharpe, both of Cheltenham. Four sisters and four brothers also survive as follows: Mrs. Aytan Mills; Mrs. Foster, of Toronto; Mrs. Postel, of Brantford; Mrs. Hixcock, of Hamilton; James, of Campbell's Cross; George of Norval; Nell and Robert, of Toronto.

The funeral, which was largely attended, took place from the family residence, the impressive service being conducted by Rev. John Hurst, of Inneswood and Rev. J. A. Leese, of the Huttonville circuit. Interment took place at Norval cemetery, where the remains were laid to rest amid a profusion of beautiful floral tributes. The bearers were William Dolson, Joseph Dolson, Frank Williamson, Herbert Taylor, Archie Fuller and Harry Carnwell.

WARNING

CANADA FACES A WOOD-FUEL FAMINE NEXT WINTER

ARE YOU one of the Canadian householders who burned sences doors and even flooring to keep warm in this winter's sub-zero weather? Or perhaps you are one of the lucky ones who just managed to scrape through?

In either case, you will want to be prepared for next winter when greater hardships loom unless you take immediate action.

The shortage already has affected many communities... total stocks of dry wood are nearly exhausted... in some places the small supply of green wood cut for next winter is being used now to meet the present emergency.

Throughout most of Canada, fuel-wood is obtained not far from where it is consumed. Its production and distribution are the business of local citizens.

The Dominion Government recognizes that the wood-fuel shortage is so serious that even with the full co-operation of everyone in affected communities an adequate supply is not assured. Accordingly, it has been decided to stimulate the output of wood-fuel by assisting those normally engaged in its production and distribution. To this end the following measures will be adopted:

- 1 A subsidy of \$1.00 per cord will be paid to dealers on all commercial fuel-wood contracted for and cut on or before June 30, 1943, and held to dealers' account on that date.
- 2 The Coal Controller has been authorized to arrange in his discretion for the payment of such portion of the transportation costs as he considers proper in respect of fuel-wood, particularly in cases where dealers, to procure supplies, find it necessary to contract for fuel-wood at locations outside the area from which they normally derive their supplies. In order to obtain any such reimbursement, dealers must obtain a permit from the Coal Controller before contracting for such supplies.
- 3 The Coal Controller will repurchase from dealers at dealer's cost all commercial grades of fuel-wood on which a subsidy of \$1 per cord has been paid and which are still in dealers' hands as at May 31, 1944.
- 4 Assistance will be given in providing priorities for necessary equipment.
- 5 Farmers now on the farm and who leave the farm temporarily in response to this appeal to engage in fuel-wood cutting, will be deemed by National Selective Service to be carrying out their regular occupation as farmers and will be given all the rights of deferment of military service which such an occupation now carries. Such temporary absence should not, however, interfere with agricultural production.

Municipal councils, farmers, fuel dealers, individual citizens, service clubs, and all other groups in communities where wood-fuel is burned, are urged to begin at once a rapid survey of their local situation, and to take immediate action to relieve the shortage.
