Arthur Dayfoot Wins Six Scholarships at Graduation

Friends of Mr. Arthur Dayfoot, who have followed with interest his career since his schooldays in Georgetown Public and High Schools, were delighted to learn last week of the honors awarded him at graduation from Emmanuel College, Toronto.

He won the following awards: General Proficiency scholarship (including the Gordon Hamilton scholarship); The Francis Houston Wallace prize (New Testament III); T. B. Kirkpatrick scholarship (Systematic Theology III); John Smith Memorial scholarship (Pastoral Theology and Church Work); a special prize in common worship, and a post-graduate fellowship of \$750.

In 1938 he registered at Victoria College (University of Toronto) as a student in Arts, taking the English and History course, and four years later received his degree of B.A. with honors.

A summer spent on a mission field in Northern Ontario stimulated a growing interest in the plight of Canadian families who are forced to live on inadequate incomes.

Returning to Canada in September, 1939, he spent the next year, as a factory worker in Coaticook, P.Q. using his leisure hours in organizing adult study groups for the Workers' Educational Association of Canada.
