EASTER'S CHANGING DATES

The ladies will have a real grievance against the weatherman if he doesn't produce a nice balmy Sunday for the Easter parade. This year Easter falls on its latest possible date, April 25th. Only once in the past 100 years—in 1886—has it been so late. It will not happen again in this century.

We've always been curious about just how Easter was timed. We found it was worked out by the early Christian Church at the Council of Nicea, in 325 A.D., and the process of arriving at a date for Easter has never been changed. It must closely follow the spring equinox, and also must closely follow a full moon in order to light the way for pilgrims' travel to festivals. The Council arbitrarily fixed the 14th day of the Jewish "paschal (Passover) month", as the day of the moon. Easter must follow the Jewish Passover (which always falls on the 14th day of the paschal month) to avoid conflict between the two holy days, be on a Sunday.
