HOSPITAL—Last week this committee packed and shipped 30 large, 10 medium and 120 small surgical dressings, 400 4x4 and 600 2x2 wipes. It is nice to know that this branch is doing this worthwhile work under the careful supervision of Mr. J. Campbell R.N. The **RED CROSS** is always ready for any emergency and her shelves are well-stocked. Prime Minister King told a luncheon audience at the Royal York, Toronto on Monday that a second front in Europe might start at any moment and it is nice to know that the **RED CROSS** are prepared to meet the needs of our boys when the time comes.
SHIPPING—This committee reports that a fine shipment was packed last week consisting of 5 boxes of Hospital dressings, 1 carton box-linings, 1 carton children clothing containing children's clothing, 10 quilts, 6 afghans etc.

Canada's Leading Blood Donor
Mr. Gerald Minor, 46-year-old post office employee, has made 22 donations equal to slightly more than two gallons. Three times Mr. Minor applied for enlistment in the Canadian army but was turned down repeatedly because of his obesity. "The army would not take me so I felt the least I could do was to give my blood to the **RED CROSS** and I hoped my blood might be saving the life of some Canadian boy overseas." Mr. Minor says he never has felt any ill effects from his experience and recommends that every red-blooded Canadian should do his part.

A New Undertaking
To provide victims of enemy submarine attacks with warm, dry clothing the RCAF has asked the Canadian **RED CROSS** to supply comforts for survivors' backs.
Woolen sweaters, underwear, Balachava helmets, mufflers, socks and mitts are wrapped around the food supply of chocolate tea biscuits, canned fruit juice, corned beef and condensed milk which are dropped from the air to helpless seafarers awaiting rescue.
The **RED CROSS** has already contributed enough knitted goods to equip over 100 boys.
