Some Questions and Answers

- Am I paid? A. Yes, with certain minor deduction for regimental expenses.
- Is my uniform free? A. Yes.
- Will I be equipped? A. Yes, immediately and with the finest, modern weapons in use on world battle fronts to-day.
- Do I wear my uniform every day? A. No, only at times of training.
- How am I to be identified as a member of the Reserve Army on other days? A. You will wear in your lapel a miniature Badge.
- If I have a business of my own, what happens to that business if I am summoned, say, to an airport in Northern Ontario? A. If you are not ready to go to Northern Ontario, pretty soon you may not have a business.
- If a group of us at the office or club want to join together, can we stick together in the same Unit? A. Yes, provided it doesn't put undue hardship on your firm during the camp period.
- Should I tell my employer that I am a Reserve Army member? A. Yes, and count on him for all possible assistance in helping you meet your added responsibilities.



To Be Eligible

for the Lorne Scots Reserve, a man must belong to one of seven age groups: 17 and 18 years of age, single men 42½ to 50 years, married men 28½ to 50 years, Great War Veterans up to 55 years (these four are open to men of categories "A", "B" and "C"), all men 17 to 50 years in category "C". Those who have received Active Army postponement and those who have been rejected for Active Service.

What is the Reserve Army?

Canada's Reserve Army is to Canada what the Home Guard is and has been to England, what the people of Leningrad, of Stalingrad, the people who fought shoulder to shoulder in the ruins of their homes, have been to Russia. At the outbreak of the war Canada had a very small Regular Army. Canada's real Army was the Non-Permanent Active Militia—what is known today as the Reserve Army. When war broke out the units of the N.P.A.M. were mobilized as and when required to make the Divisions of the Active Army. As each Unit was mobilized, it threw off a counterpart or Home Defence Unit—the Reserve Army. Prior to the war, any man of any age or medical category who was moderately physically fit could join the Reserve Army

Today there can be no encroachment upon the manpower field for the Active Army. The Reserve Army appeals, therefore, to all who are in the categories listed in the centre panel to join the Lorne Scots Reserve for Home Defence.
