4th Victory Loan Features Agricultural Committee Discussion Period

W. P. Watson, Assistant Director of the Ontario Livestock Branch, was the special speaker at a recent meeting of the Halton Agricultural War Service Committee held in Million on Thursday evening of last week.

The major part of Mr. Watson's address pertained to the question of meat supplies. The speaker pointed out that in pre-war days, two thirds of Orest Britain's imports of mests came from south of the equator. Today stated er. Watson, while some of these supplies are going to North Africa, little if any is finding its way to Orest Britain Under present conditions, he stated, 40 per cent of both the U. B. and Canadion meet production is finding its way to Orest Britain. Mr. Watson stated we are today producing more meat than in the previous history of the North American continent and consequently have two options-either to consume more ourselves than ever before, or share what we have with those on the first line of defence.

It is my opinion, stated Mr. Watson, that is is economically unsound for un in Canada to attempt to compete with Bouth American in beef production once prace is restored. Consequently our aim in so far as beef is concerned, should be to produce more beef without increasing our number of beef cattle On the other hand, from the standpoint of pork, we should be able to compete with any country in the world It may mean, he stated, that there will have to be some further adjustments in the freight rate on grain from the west. He further pointed out that we can increase our production of pork much more rapidly than we can beef. An additional ton of pork can be produced 10 months after breeding. Mr. Watson also pointed out that while our marketings to date are somewhat lower than for the same period last year nevertheless the response to the appeal which has been made here in Ontario has been magnificent, and added that he had no hesitation in stating that marketings in the last four months of this year will be up 20 per cent over those of the same period in 1943. Our objective today, he stated, should be not more units of production, but more production per unit. Reference was also made by the speaker to the shortage of protein concentrates. Supplies are higher than a year ago but people are feeding much more. Meat he stated is just as plentiful but more has been slaughtered in places where much of the by-products have been lost. Black markets, stated Mr. Watson, have been responsible for the loss of a tremendous amount of tankage.

The speaker discussed alfalfa, flax, soybeans, and peas as crops having possibilities of producing a portion at least of the protein required for livestock feeding Mr. Watson reviewed the labour situation and made reference to the various types of labour which the government is attempting to

make available.


Paul Fisher, County Chairman of the Agricultural section for the Pourth Victory Loan. gave a brief but stirring appeal for farmers to increase their purchases of the Victory Bonds in the Campaign which will open abortly. It is essential stated Mr. Fisher, for Agriculture to use its creoit if the Loan is to be put over and in order to prevent inflation, it must be put over. Victory Bonds provide, the best collateral which a farmer can have, said Mr. Fisher, since he can borrow up to the face value of the bond and for a period of 14 years at a rate of 4 per cent. In as much as the bonds bear 3 per cent, it means he is getting his money for 1 per cent. In other words a \$1000. bond if borrowed on to its face value, will only cost the individual \$10.00 a year, and that is a small amount for those of us who are at home to pay when we consider that many of our boys will give their lives.

Others who spoke at the meeting, which was presided over by W. E. Breckon, Chairman of the War Service Committee, included Amos Mason, County Chairman for the Victory Loan and Mr. McGinnis, County Organizer.
