Meeting in regular session on Monday evening. Georgetown municipal council agent a fairly busy evening interviewing a number of deputations. The first deputation of thirteen or fourteen residents from King Birest district waited on Council in regard the amoke nuisance from the Cia Products Co. Ltd., Those addressing council were Ed.McWhirter, D. P. Criciton, Mrs. Preston and Mrs. Bulger. The deputation said they had no intention of trying to put this fire out of business, but asked council for some decision on the matter of smoke nulsance, which had been discussed on previous occasions.

After considerable discussion council passed a motion, authorizing that a smoke nulsance by-law be prepared, and said that, if passed, would see that it was enforced. Mayor Gibbons, however, pointed out that this by-law did not affect any one firm but all places in town from which amoke became a nuisance A recorded vote was then taken on the motion and it passed unani-
