RED CROSS NEWS

Georgetown, Ont.

Bells have been used to call worshippers to church or citizens to assemblies, to invite to prayer at a fixed hour (Angelus), at the consecration of the Host (Bantus), when a person is dying (quitting bells), or a death, to celebrate victories, festivals, and weddings, to give notice that lights must be put out (curfew), or that fire or enemies threaten the city (alarm).

For the first time in nearly three years the church bells in Great Britain called the worshippers to the many Easter services throughout the land. For nearly three years the people were warned that church bells would sound the alarm of invasion but thank God that time apparently has past.

In yet another country—Holland—church bells peal by transcription, the real bells having been confiscated by the conquering Germans.

And in this fair land of ours—bells have never ceased ringing—but they might be an alarm for an invasion—or they might be stolen by conquerors—so for the next three weeks let their message be—"Back the Attack."

In Our Work-Rooms
SEWING—We now have plenty of garments cut out and you may have your choice of girls' jumpers or blouses, babies' gowns or women's nightgowns, to sew or handkerchiefs to hem. If you cannot come to the rooms, send for something for British children.

Why clothing is not difficult to answer. The question is not difficult to answer. Nearly two million children have been removed from their homes for fear of bombing another half million have been removed because their homes have been destroyed. Of this number three hundred thousand are orphans or children who have either lost their parents or been abandoned by them. If there was no more bombing at all there would still be more to do than the Canadian Red Cross could hope to accomplish. Children wear out and grow out of their clothes. As more and more British women are called up to work in munition plants and other war equipment factories there are less left to make children's clothes. Word has been received that clothing is far more acceptable to the people of Britain than gifts of cash. This is very much more the case when applied to gifts made to the Red Cross where money is used to purchase material and that material is made into clothes and delivered in Britain a completely free of all charges. In this way a gift of one dollar becomes three dollars by the time it reaches Britain.

Prisoners-of-War Parcels
