R. and were delivered to the Glen Dronach Farm on the 8th Line. Mr. Chas. Gilbert, Jr., of Toronto, is the importer of these pure bred Hackneys, having purchased these from the Dodge Farms of Rochester, Mich. Some of these ponies have been purchased by horse owners from Toronto. While in Georgetown the Hackneys are under the care of Mr. Sam Bakeman of Toronto who has been connected with the Gilbert stables for over 20 years and is well known throughout Canada.
