

# "BACK THE ATTACK" BUY VICTORY LOAN BONDS

## Potato Price Ceiling Being Violated

More than 20 cases of alleged violation of Wartime Prices and Trade Board orders and rulings respecting the sale of seed potatoes are under investigation in the Toronto district by the enforcement division of the Board.

Order 156 exempts seed potatoes from the provisions of the price ceiling. The Board has ruled that seed potatoes are only exempt when sold in original containers with tags attached certifying them to be seed potatoes. When the tag is removed, they must be sold within the maximum price structure as provided in Order 156.

Complaints have been received that some Toronto dealers were buying seed potatoes, repacking them without tags into lots of from five to 15 pounds and selling them at prices above those set in Order 156.

Fred W. Hall, assistant director of retail foods, explained that bagged seed potatoes may be repacked for sale above the price ceiling provided an inspector of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is present to mark and tag them.

## Annual Meeting Halton-Peel Children's Aid Society

The annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society of Peel and Halton Counties was held in the Sunday School room of St. Paul's United Church, Brampton, on the evening of April 27th. The President Mrs. W. J. Hood of Brampton conducted the meeting which was opened with prayer by Rev. J. B. Moore of Milton. Mrs. Hood briefly reviewed the plan under which the Committee have jointly carried on the work of the Society. Owing to inclement weather the attendance was not as large as usual.

The Treasurer's report was submitted showing total receipts of \$18,261.26. Of this amount \$3,555.87 was received from the Dependent's Allowance Board at Ottawa for administration on the part of Soldier's families.

The Superintendent, G. P. Thompson, submitted his report on the year's work mentioning in particular the increased work pertaining to soldiers' families and the administration of allowances in special cases. A total of 299 child protection cases were dealt with, including soldiers' families, with a total of 641 children involved. 121 children were reported under the care of the Society, at the end of the year, an increase of 10 over a year ago.

The guest speaker of the evening, Mr. Niram Fletcher, President of the Wentworth County Society, chose as his subject "The Value of Municipal Support for the Children's Aid Society." Mr. Fletcher stressed the great need of child welfare work and also the necessity of greater co-operation between the Municipal bodies and the Society with the joint object in view of the

building of better citizens. A vote of thanks was extended to the speaker by Mr. J. G. Hooper, Halton Greetings were extended to Mr. Burns of the Hamilton Society and Mr. C. M. Platt, Superintendent of Wentworth County Society. The following officers were appointed for the ensuing year.
