In view of the many new war industries in our district, we naturally have had a great influx of people from every province in the Dominion. This is creating a serious housing problem which is being overcome to some extent by a Wartime Housing Program Pamilles have been forced to live under very crowded conditions, renting cottages originally built for Bummer use only, and most unsuitable for Winter habitation. Other families are making their homes in trailers, which while reasonably comfortable, are not condusive to a good moral situation nor proper supervision. Many of these prople also find it most difficult to rent suitable homes when they have young children-reasonable possibly on the part of the landlord-but the fact remairs that the children are entitled to a comfortable home, and the parents, in most cases, are not in a position financially to build or buy their own

Our society works through a Branch Office period of two years. in Hamilton, and during the past 116 cases were investigated Based on our report and recommendations, financial assistance has been rendered in the majority of these cases. We have also been requested in ten different cases to submit a report on the home situation where the soldier applies for leave or discharge from the army on compassionate grounds.
