# The Editor's Corner

## A GOOD SOLID PLANK

A saving of 60 cents a month, or \$5.00 a year, is not to be despised, and that is what the new reduction in the domestic Hydro rate will mean to consumers in Georgetown and Glen Williams.

In order to bring about this lowering of the rate, the local Commission had to petition the Ontario Hydro Commission and gain their consent before the rate could be altered. Naturally, in view of the more-than-healthy surplus of funds on hand here, there wasn't a great deal of difficulty in having the request granted. As a result, Georgetown now enjoys a lower rate than is in operation in Toronto, Hamilton, and many other nearby centres.

The finances of the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission are in even better shape than those of the local commission. We can't see why a publicor government-owned, enterprise—should be allowed to build up such a large surplus. Perhaps the huge profits do come back to us in some measure in one form or another. It's true they invest large sums in Victory Bonds, and so on. But if that extra purchasing power were given to the householders, we believe the country would benefit just as much from individual contributions to government projects and the many other worthy causes we are called upon to support.

An election in Ontario seems imminent this summer, and it's generally believed that such a time is always auspicious for the mentioning of intended "reforms". To date we've seen nothing mentioned about the Hydro, but it seems to us it would make a solid plank in somebody's platform. Municipal government is really Provincial government on a small scale. When such a large credit balance accumulated on the books of the local Commission, they felt it their duty to the citizens to make a reduction in charges for their power. A sense of public responsibility is a good thing to have in a public body, be it municipal or provincial.
