With their first public appearance behind them a rousing reception—members of the Canadian Women's Army Corps military pipe band, formed at Pacific Command and brought here three months ago for further training, are preparing for a full schedule of performances.

Leader and organizer of the band is Lt. Col. Lillian Grant, of Victoria. Before enlisting she was leader of the Highland Lassie Pipe Band there and was known, too, as Victoria's official "welcomer"—meeting incoming ferries with steamered pipes.

Pipe Sgt. Grant is proud of her bandmates but stresses that this is only the nucleus. She feels, however, that when intensive training and rehearsals are done it will sit with any other women's pipe band in existence.

Many diversified occupations are represented in the band's membership.

Pte. Lorna Doull, of Regina, Sask., was a member of Pipe Sgt. Grant's original band in Victoria. Two of her brothers are serving in the Royal Canadian Navy.

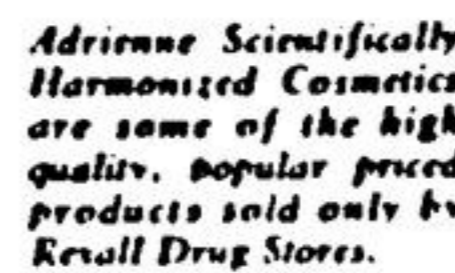
