### Council to Co-operate with Coal Dealers Secretary Resigns from Ration Board

#### Fair Board Enthusiastic Over 1943 Show

To be held this year on September 18th and 19th.

Every effort is being put forth by the Georgetown Fair Board to keep up the standard of the local show through their strenuous war time. The Board feels that the fair is one of the links in our way of life that should be continued at all cost, and their decision is backed up by the Department of Agriculture, who stress the importance of maintaining the fair fair at this time.

Meeting at the McOrbon House on Saturday evening, the local Board, with President Craig Reid in the chair, held a very enthusiastic meeting. Reports were given by the Directors of the Victory Garden displays which both the rural and town public schools will compete in four prizes have been offered to rural schools competing in this contest, and the Board further decided that separate prizes be given to Georgetown Public School, the different grades in the school competing against one another instead of competing against the rural schools. This means that over \$200 in prizes will be offered for Victory Garden vegetable displays at the Fair by school children.

Two new directors were also appointed, Mrs. Ovean Lindsay replacing Mr. Oscar Leitch, who moved recently to Puelin, Ont., and Mr. Frank Petch, who replaces Mr. Garfield L. McCullough, who has taken over the duties of Secretary of the Fair Board.

Craig Reid and J. Bird were appointed as a committee to arrange for the fair night dance, to be held on Friday, Sept. 10th.

Collectors for donations to the fair were also named in the different districts of the Town and Township, but a donation handed to any member of the Society or to the Secretary will be gratefully received. Advertising space will also be available in the prize list for those wishing to support the show in this manner. Donations of \$100.00 in cash, and numerous donations in goods have already come in, and were announced by the Secretary.

It was decided to offer a special prize list to the Halton Jersey Breeders Club to show at Georgetown this year, and the Secretary was instructed to write Mr. J. E. Whitelock, Agricultural Representative to this effect. It is hoped that this year will be Georgetown's turn to have this outstanding Jersey show, especially when the majority of the breeders come from this end of the County.

The meeting night was also changed from Saturday to Wednesday in order to give directors a better chance to get to the meeting, due to the early closing on Saturday evenings. The next meeting of the Board will be held on July 14th.

—Miss Agnes Macphail, former member of Parliament for Grey-Bruce, was nominated CCF Candidate for the Provincial constituency of York East when a nominating convention was held on Saturday, June 12th. Hon. George S. Henry now sits for the riding.

Council assembled at a special session last Monday night to meet a deputation of coal dealers of town, to consider ways and means of bringing to the attention of the citizens the seriousness of the coal shortage in the coming winter season.

The coal dealers estimate that everybody will have to use 30 per cent substitute for the anthracite coal, and they requested the co-operation of Council in helping them work towards a fair distribution for everyone. After the matter had been discussed at length, it was moved by W. P. Thompson and seconded by C. Bradley that the following resolution be passed:

"That this Council, having had the seriousness of the fuel situation brought to their attention, and in co-operation with the local coal dealers, make representations to the Fuel Controller of Canada, whereby a fair distribution of fuel for the Town of Georgetown may be made, and that a committee composed of Messrs. W. P. Thompson, Jos. Hall and C. Bradley be appointed to work in conjunction with the distributors."

A petition signed by a number of merchants was presented to Council, asking that a civic holiday be proclaimed Monday, July 19th, instead of observing the national holiday July 1st. Council were of the opinion that to comply with this request would considerably confuse matters and therefore decided to take no action.

The secretary of the Ration Board, P. H. Harrison, tendered his resignation.

### Halton Farmers Require Help to Take Off Hay Crop

Present prospects, states Agricultural Representative J. E. Whitelock, point to increasing food shortages this coming winter. He pointed out that less than 50 per cent of our 1942 acreages of oats and barley has been sown this spring and with seeding six weeks later than a year ago, it is difficult to see much hope for anything like a normal crop, even on the acreage sown. Hay on the other hand is, almost without exception, a heavy crop. In order to save this feed Halton farmers are going to need almost unlimited help. With prospects for a short crop of grain in Ontario and with the difficulty of getting grain from the West, owing to transportation difficulties and with the shortage of protein concentrates, the hay crop must be saved if we are to have anything like enough milk for our urban markets this coming winter. This means that the help of every available man is required.
