FORMER GEORGETOWN BOY BURIED AT KREFELD, GERMANY

But Jack Smith, R.S.A.P. only son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon A. Smith of Hamilton and grandson of Mrs. Coffin, Sr. at Georgetown, is officially listed as killed while on active service and buried at Krefeld, Germany. Word came June 21st. The whole crew failed to return to their base, following a bombing raid over Düsseldorf on Sept. 16, 1942 and have been listed as missing since that time, with the exception of one, John Needer of Humber Bay, who also was buried at Krefeld.

Jack was born in Hamilton but attended public school at Georgetown and Howard Park and Runnymede Collegiate. He was employed at National Steel Car Hamilton, at time of enlistment, January 1941, but was employed at the Hamilton Spector and Remington Band previously. He trained at Guelph and Jarvis and went overseas April of 1942 and took part in many bombing raids, as a wireless operator.
