ONTARIO ELECTIONS
RESERVE ARMY UNITS

ARRANGEMENTS have been made for members of the Reserve Units of the Canadian Militia who will be in Camp during the week commencing Sunday, August 1st, 1943, to record their votes in the present election to the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. Members of such units in Military District No. 1, and Military District No. 2, will be allowed to vote at Advance Polls, as listed below, on Saturday, July 31st, 1943. The Department of National Defence (Army) has arranged the schedule of training for Reserve Units of Military District No. 3 so as to permit members of Reserve Units from this district to leave Connaught Ranges Camp on Tuesday, August 3rd and be home in time to vote on Wednesday, August 4th, 1943. The Advance Polls available for members of Reserve Units of Canadian Militia, Travellers, Railwaymen and Mariners will be open from 8 o'clock A.M. until 5 o'clock P.M. and from 7 o'clock P.M. until 10 o'clock P.M. on Saturday, July 31st, and Monday and Tuesday, August 2nd and 3rd, in the following places:—
