F.O. Evans and Mrs. James Evans Presented to Duke and Duchess of Windsor



At a small dinner party, given recently by one of Nassau's distinguished families, Flying Officer and Mrs. James F. Evans were formally presented to the Duke and Duchess of Windsor. Flying Officer Evans, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter T. Evans, has been stationed at Nassau for the past year. Mrs. Evans is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Frank, Rockwood and is well known in this town where she taught for several years in the Public School.

In his letter home, F. O. Evans tells that the Windsors are very highly thought of in the Bahamas, and that the Duchess gives a great deal of her time to Red Cross work and other war activities. Considered one of the world's best dressed women, it was of interest to know that at the dinner party aforementioned, she wore an evening gown, fashioned with black net skirt, white jacket and a corsage of gardenias. On the evening following the dinner party, the Windsors made a short appearance at an Air-force party, and Mrs. Evans was quite thrilled when, on her way out, the Duchess stopped and spoke to her by name.

F. O. Evans has been stationed at the RAF station in the Bahamas since last November and Mrs. Evans joined her husband there in January.
