Under the new regulations, certain other persons are entitled to a marriage allowance, including a person who maintains a home for the dependent children of a soldier who is a widower or whose wife has left him or is an inmate of an institution. Cost of the extension is estimated at 100,000 a year divided as follows: Navy, 10,000; RCAF, 20,000 and Army 50,000.
