GEORGETOWN SOLDIERS COMFORTS COMMITTEE

Georgetown, Ont., Sept. 7th, 1943

Here is a letter typical of many received from our boys overseas, acknowledging cigarettes sent to them in our last shipment of May 1st, 1943. In this shipment, cigarettes were sent to 219 men in the services overseas and 3 prisoners-of-war.

Dear Secretary:

In regards to the cigarette that I received recently, would you please let the members of the Soldiers' Comforts Committee know that I am heartily grateful for them.

After being over here for a couple of years I begin to get terribly monotonous but it certainly does help to know that we are still remembered by the people at home.

Although I've said that life gets monotonous, it isn't because the people here don't try to make it interesting for us. They are very good and do all they possibly can to make us feel as much at home as possible. For instance, in the nearby village they have a Residents' Hospitality Association which puts on dances, meals, card parties, etc., for our benefit.

I like practically everything about England and I'm sure that we will all leave here with many happy memories. How soon we'll leave still remains a mystery, but of course, we are all anxiously looking forward to the day when we can live normal lives again.
