It is understood that from 10 p.m. November 10th until 11 a.m. November 11th a guard of honor will be guarding the cenotaph and the guard of honor comprising 4 Veterans will be changed every fifteen minutes. Sgt. Russell will be the official bugler at the ceremony. One item of interest was the statement made that the 80th Company have organized a Veteran Guard Cadet Corp. comprising 40 Cadets. Each member of this Corp. ranges in age from 12 to 15 years and are the sons of a Veteran or of a father now serving overseas. The boys have their own bugle corps and are instructed in the use of modern weapons. His Majesty the King is the Honorable Colonel and has granted the 80th Veterans Guard full authorization to establish this Cadet Corp. This group is under the supervision of Sgt. Russell and Sgt. Hockney.

In a personal interview with Major Pickering he stated the following: "Our visit to Georgetown has been greatly enjoyed, thanks to all your good citizens for the reception accorded my Company, thanks to the Canadian Legion, Members of the Council and all those who have made our visit so pleasant."
