GOOD PROSPECTS

Visions of succulent venison steaks unrationed and couponless are flitting through the minds of many residents of the Township of Esqueving with the prospect of an open deer-hunting season this year.

It's many years since deer hunting has been unrestricted in this district. According to all reports, foxes as well as deer are quite plentiful. One reason given for this unusual state of affairs is that the wolves are driving both kinds of game southward. The deer are evidently so common they're becoming a nuisance. Farmers and suburban townspeople are having difficulty in garnering their garden crops before the animals get here first. Deer are evidently very fond of vegetables of any description and find a garden full too hard to resist.

Yes, the prospects are exceedingly good for hunters (and their friends) this fall—and venison sure is good!

THE MOVIES

"Take your girls to the Movies, if you can't make love at home." Whether more and more young blades are taking the song to heart, or whether the girls are out on their own is not to be found in Bureau records, but it is known that almost 180 million admissions to motion picture theatres were chalked up last year. That means about 17 million more tickets were sold than in 1941, raising box office receipts, exclusive of all taxes, from \$42 million to \$47 million.

As a matter of fact, it is estimated that each person in the Dominion, man, woman and child, spent about \$4.10 on movies last year. That may seem like a lot of money but in most cases it was probably considered well spent. A good moving picture boisters morale. Ask our soldier or sailor, or boy in Airforce blue. Men and women under arms at home and abroad find decent, satisfying and cheap entertainment in the theatre. They would be lost without such means of passing time.

Besides being used for entertainment, moving pictures are going to school. Students in Public Schools are learning their geography lessons, their social studies, their science by the aid of motion pictures; men in the forces master their new jobs by receiving some of their instruction through the medium of moving pictures. There's no doubt about it, movies are doing a magnificent war work, fighting against complacency with their up-to-the-minute newsreels, bringing far-off battle fields to our own back doors, providing recreation and relaxation from the toils of war for soldiers and civilians alike, and speeding up and simplifying education in all walks of life.

CONCRETE RESULTS

The announcement of Mr. Howe that owners of passenger cars may have their tires retreaded with camelback rubber of the passenger type without a tire ration permit will be welcome to Canadian motorists. Following the increase of the ration of tea and coffee, it is also an encouraging sign that the Government is ready, when adequate resources are available, to mitigate the drastic sacrifices it has had to impose upon the Canadian people for the purpose of the war.

But the people also owe this recovery of a lost privilege to their own efforts. It has been the creditable work of some 2000 salvage committees, organized all over the Dominion for the purpose of collecting old tires and tubes and other waste rubber that has produced the material to make possible the concession now granted. Salvage committees like that of the Lions Club in Georgetown, and their helpers, the school children who have given freely of their time and energy to the work of these committees, deserve the gratitude of the motoring community.

Despite the mounting output of synthetic rubber there still is a shortage of rubber necessary for the manufacture of new tires, and salvaging rubber tires and tubes is still imperative. The concession is not to be regarded as the termination of this. It provides evidence of how motorists can help themselves by helping the salvage committees. And there's no place to start like home. The newly formed Boy Scouts here have organized a salvage collection, details of which will appear in this paper from time to time. The only items they do not want are glass bottles and fats. They're going to buy uniforms and equipment with the proceeds from their salvage effort. We salute this Voluntary Salvage Committee and as well as the donating citizens of town. Their contribution to the war effort is far reaching as can be seen from the fact that these two factions throughout Canada have made it possible to control the rubber situation today.
