### Halton Holstein Breeders Outstanding at Oakville Championship Show

Halton Holstein Breeders not only maintained but added to their laurels at the Oakville Championship Show on October 8. They were particularly outstanding in the male classes and their entries topped no less than four of the six classes. In the aged bull class E. Segenorth & Son of Freeman won first on Springbank Rag Apple Prince; in the two year old class W. B. Hall & Son of Oakville secured premier honours on Elm Columbus Rag Apple Righto, which animal was later adjudged reserve senior and reserve grand champion bull of the show by Judge Clarence Goodhue of Vaudreuil, Que.

Dr. Chas. N. Blanshard of Freeman went to the top in the senior yearling class on Meadowood Lochivar, while Frank Pelletier & Sons of Milton were first in the big bull calf class which brought out 23 entries, on their home bred senior calf Ashville Pietje DeKol. This calf was later declared Junior Champion, with the Blanshard entry made reserve junior champion. Fred Hamilton & Sons of Freeman placed sixth in the two year old class on Posch Acme DeKol; Elton McLean of Oakville, third in the bull calf class on Spring Farm Carl Innovation; and G. Leslie Peer & Son of Milton, were ninth in the same class on their junior calf Hillandale Alcatraz.

In the female classes, Morley Watson of Tanaley, and Robinson Bros. of Georgetown, were sixth and seventh respectively in the aged cow class which brought out 21 entries. It will be recalled the Watson cow was Grand Champion Female at the Halton County Show. This animal namely Snowball Sylvia Alcatraz, has several outstanding records including a 305 day 16000 lb. 3.98 B.P. record on two times milking. She is entered in the All Canadian Sale to be held on November 11th. It will also be of interest to learn that the Robinson cow namely Fawcett

Pesch Abbekerk has since the Oakville Show, finished her yearly record with over 30000 lbs. milk on two times milking.

In the Junior Yearling heifer class W. B. Hall, and T. J. Snowdrige of Georgetown, were second and third respectively. Other Halton breeders whose entries were prominent contestants in the big show which brought out 151 entries from 8 counties, included A. Stark & Son, Milton; V. J. Lawrence, of Oakville.

The Inter-County herd class brought out herds from 8 counties and it was with difficulty that Judge Goodhue made his decision among the first four. The awards were as follows: 1st, Peal; 2nd, York; 3rd, Halton; 4th, Simcoe; 5th, Wellington; 6th, Wentworth; 7th, Waterloo; and 8th, Haltonland.

Prominent breeders were present from all sections of the province and were loud in their praises of the splendid accommodation which had been provided through the joint co-operation of the Town of Oakville and the executive of the Halton Holstein Club. According to several of these men who had attended all four of the Championship Shows held in the Province, the Oakville event was the most outstanding not only for the quality of the cattle but also from the standpoint of accommodation, which is indeed a distinct feather in the cap of President Ed. Woodley and his associates. According to Judge Clarence Goodhue, the quality of the entries equalled anything he had ever previously judged at either the C.N.E. or Royal Winter Fair.

### Halton County Plowing Match Scheduled for November 5th

Robinson of the Halton Plowmen's Ass'n., the big Annual Match is scheduled for Friday, November 5th, on the Bert Fuller farm on the seventh line of Trafalgar Township, below Drumquinn.
