FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR HERBERT EDWARD PANN

The service was held privately from his home and interment was in Woodland Cemetery, Quirph.

Born in England, Mr. Pann came to Canada with his parents, when eleven months of age and has lived in Quirph since that time. He attended Miss McDonald's Private School, Quirph; Quirph Business College and Ontario School of Pharmacy. He was manager of drug stores in Toronto and Chicago, returning to Quirph to take over his father's contracting business. He retired about nine years ago. In his younger days, Mr. Pann was actively interested in hockey, lacrosse and football. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Besides his widow, the former Edith Ann Andrews, four children survive and are: Herbert A. of Toronto; Gordon E. of Preston and the V. M.C.A., R.C.A.P., Centralia; and Misses Evelyn and Peggy of Quirph.
