Haltom Raised 102 Per Cent. Fifth Victory Loan Quota

Total of \$2,343,150 Was Raised This Year—Complete Figures for the Various Municipalities Now Available

The summary of returns from the Fifth Victory Loan for Haltom County has been issued from headquarters in Oakville, as it appeared on November 6th at the close of the loan. It shows that Haltom as a whole raised 102% of its quota. The quota was this loan \$2,295,000 and the amount raised was \$2,343,150. Last year the quota was \$2,150,000 and the amount raised was \$2,358,350. While we have obtained our county objective this time it will be well to remember that we did not in Haltom reach the amount in this loan to equal that of the Fourth Loan.

Three units in the County passed their respective Quotas: Oakville secured 111 per cent, part of Nelson Township 111 per cent and Acton and Burlington each 107 per cent. The tabulations for the various municipalities are: Acton—107 per cent of quota raised \$207,750. Had 1,127 applications. Population according to 1937 statistics, 1934. This amount also included a district of Esopus Township to the Seventh Line and south to Limehouse and to the Nassagaweya Town Line. The population of this section is not given separately, but would not amount to over 350.

Burlington—107 per cent of quota raised \$228,750. There were 1,229 applications. Population 4,775.

Georgetown—79 per cent of quota raised \$1,813,150. There were 882 applications. Population 24,975.

Milton—88 per cent of quota raised \$1,548,500. There were 648 applications. Population 19,222.

Oakville—111 per cent of quota raised \$2,011,050. There were 1,925 applications. Population 3,504. This also includes a section of Trafalgar which is not included in the population figure.

The Townships are divided into sections with parts attached to each Municipality and to carry out the same figures. The entire results can not be tabulated.

Esopus Township had three sections each attached to Acton, Milton and Georgetown. The sections attached to Milton and Georgetown raised \$164,650 and the section attached to Acton approximately \$25,000, a total of \$189,650. The population of the whole Township is 3,129.

Nassagaweya Township is a separate unit and 92 per cent of the quota raised \$84,900. The population is 1,618.

Nelson Township raised a total of \$342,756, well over the quota of \$315,000. The population is 3,836.

In the whole county there were 7,488 applications received.

GEORGETOWN'S OLDEST RESIDENT PASSES

Georgetown's oldest resident, Mary Anne Mowell, beloved wife of the late Henry Riddall, died on December 6th, in her 93rd year.

Born in Kent, England, Mrs. Riddall came to Canada thirty years ago, and had been a resident of Georgetown for the past seventeen years. Mrs. Riddall was a great church worker. In England she was well-known as a deaconess in the All Saints Church, Edmonton. Here in Georgetown, she was a member of St. George's Church of England, and was a very active member of the Women's Auxiliary for many years.

Surviving is her only son, George Riddall, Georgetown. There are three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The funeral service was conducted from St. George's by the rector, Ven. Rev. W. G. O. Thompson, on Tuesday, Dec. 6th. Pallbearers were Messrs. Sam Walker, Joseph Hill, C. Ingham and Harry Stockford. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery.
